The spectacular silent drama "The White Sister" was shown here on Monday evening and much enjoyed.

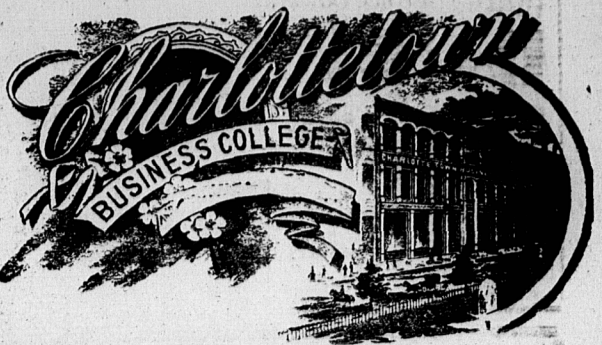

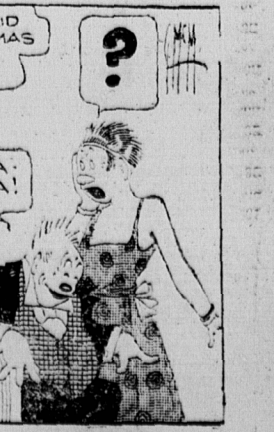
