MR. JOHN J. MCKENNA

The death occurred at the Boston City Hospital on Monday, September 12th after a brief illness of John J. McKenna, 7 Carmen St., Dorchester, Mass. The late Mr. McKenna was born at Newton Cross, P.E.I. almost 72 years ago and after teaching school in his native province for several years, immigrated to Boston where he served on the Boston Fire Department until his retirement about five years ago. On Friday evening September 9th last he suffered a stroke at his home and was removed to the City Hospital where his condition gradually grew worse and he peacefully passed away on Sept. 12th. At his bedside when he passed away were his son, Rev. Eugene McKenna, S.S.J., Wilmington, N.C., and his nephew, Rev. Phelan McKenna, Morell, P.E.I.
