THE STANLEY ARRIVES.—The C. G. S. Stanley, Captain Blod, arrived in Charlottetown yesterday afternoon at 3.15 from North Sydney, having left the latter part of the previous day at 4 p. m. The Stanley comes here to place out the coast buoys and will be here for some weeks. Of late the steamer was on ice patrol, service from Scatterie C. B. to Anticosti and from Cape Ray, Nfld., to Cape Nord, C. B. While on this duty about two weeks ago the steamer found a schooner adrift—the "Lydia Mary" of Quebec with no one aboard and towed her to the Magdalen Islands. The schooner was equipped for the fisheries and had evidently been carried away by ice. Many seals were seen while on this service.
