RECOMMENDATIONS OF COMMISSION

OTTAWA, June 4.—The Royal Commission on Industrial Training and Technical Education which held sessions in the chief centres of Canada, United States, Great Britain and other countries has submitted report the outstanding feature of which is the recommendation that the Canadian Government should set aside a fund of \$3,000,000 per year for ten years, such fund to be divided between the provinces on a basis of population for the promotion of higher Technical Education and Industrial Training.

OPENING OF UNIVERSITY

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 4.—The American University, planned years ago by Methodist Episcopal educators, became an accomplished fact today when the doors of the institution were thrown open for the first time for the reception of students. The university buildings were completed some years ago on the outskirts of this city, but the opening was delayed until funds sufficient for the maintenance of the institution were raised. The university will control a series of lectures, and will support a comprehensive system of fellowships in connection with leading educational institutions of America and Europe. It also will maintain an institute for research, to be operated in connection with the various Federal departments.

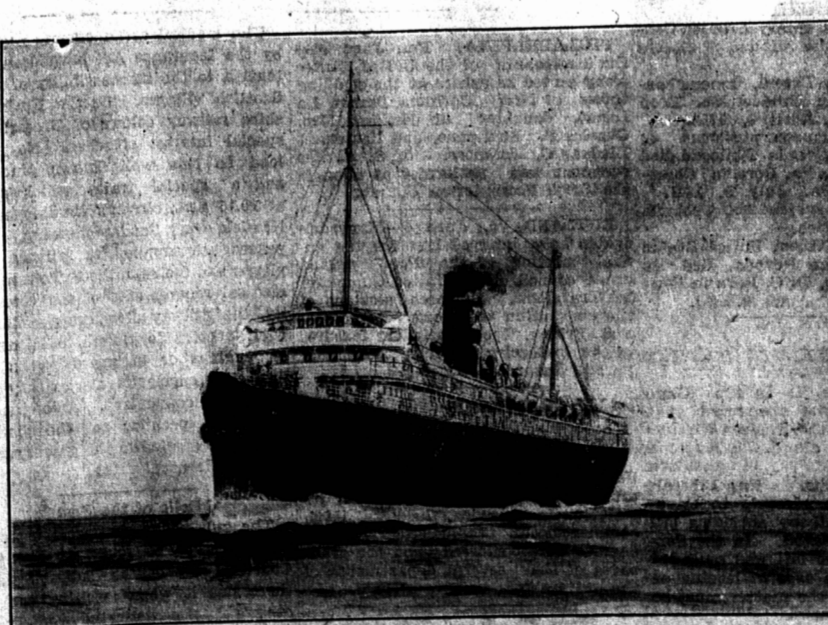

PLANT LINE S. S. EVANGELINE. The above is a cut of the magnificent last having been fourteen months under construction. Her length overall is 364 feet; breadth, 46 feet; depth, molded to main deck, 33 feet; morning draft from Boston. The displacement 5650 tons. She has two engines and six boilers of 900 horsepower and is capable of developing a speed of 18 knots. She has six decks, the deck houses being constructed of steel, and has accommodation for 700 passengers.
