BIG RUN OF FISH.—The Miramichi fishermen are reaping a great harvest just now. The mackerel drifters are getting from 1,000 to 4,000 fish every night, and the salmon boats from 25 to 100. One boat came in the other day with 6,000 mackerel. She was loaded to the gunwales. Mackerel are sold at 5 cents a pound and salmon at one dollar each, the salmon averaging ten pounds. Every cry man with boat and nets is making a pot of money.

SERGEANT MCGRATH RECOVERING—The Fredrickton Gleaner says: Mr. H. J. McGrath is in receipt of a letter from his son, Sergeant Justin McGrath, who was reported seriously wounded on May 27th. Sergeant McGrath received wounds in the face, chest and leg and at one time it was feared the wound would prove fatal. He writes very hopefully of his condition and feels he is on the road to complete recovery. He is now at a base hospital in England, where everything possible is being done for his comfort.

SOLDIER RECOVERING.—The many friends of Mr. and Mrs. George A. Wood, will be pleased to hear that their son, Howard, is getting along nicely now. Howard was gassed the last of May, and is now at a Canadian Hospital in Basingstoke, England. The latest telegram from the Officer in charge of the Hospital states that he is "progressing satisfactorily." Private Howard Francis Wood enlisted in the King's County Seige Artillery Draft Sours, with Lieut. R. C. McLean, and went overseas in April 1917. On arrival in England he was transferred to the 25th Battalion, and after training there four months he crossed over to France, while going over he took sick and was taken to a Hospital and later to a Convalescent Home where he remained a few weeks. He then joined his old comrades and with them went into the trenches on Nov. 9th where he has been almost continually ever since, nobly "doing his bit" for his King and Country.

EXCISE WAR ACT.—The Excise War Act relating to stock of matches and playing cards in Wholesale and Retailers hands comes into effect the first day of July. The Act states that every wholesale and retail dealer shall affix on each un-stamped package of matches an adhesive, or other stamp of the value of one cent for each one hundred matches, or fractional of one hundred matches, contained in such package and held by him for sale on the first day of July 1918. On each package of playing cards offered for sale on the first day of July a stamp of the value of eight cents must be affixed. For the information of the Public we may say that these stamps for the above articles may be procured at the Inland Revenue Office, Charlottetown, and at the Custom Offices at Tignish, Souris and Summerside. Wholesale Retailers and any other persons selling matches or playing cards on or after July 1st., without War Tax stamps attached will be liable to a fine of not less than one hundred dollars. 9105-6-26M51.

Therefore resolved that we consider this a premeditated affair on the part of the Railway management and a gross insult to our organization.

And further resolved that we appeal to our merchants and business men now centred in our midst to take action on our behalf to see that we get a fair deal in our time of trouble.

It was further resolved that we do our best in honour of our brother members now fighting in France to settle all the disputes without strikes.
