Tuesday the Feast of St. Joseph was celebrated in St. Joseph's Convent Chapel. First Mass was celebrated at seven o'clock by Rev. D. In the First Baptist Church at Moncton on Sunday evening last, Rev. C. W. In Winnipeg he was for years the Superintendent of the Presbyterian Sunday School of which Rev. Mr. Hogg was minister. He leaves to mourn a widow, two sons and 5 daughters who will have the sympathy of his many friends here and abroad.
