## W. C. T. U. NOTES

CANADIANIZATION

We have a wonderful opportunity to work in this department this year.

People are conserving their resources and appeals to help maintain our freedom and honor are ever before us. The thoughts of all are on Canada and its attitude to the Mother Land. Groups of men and women, too, are coming together for war work and for new industries springing up as the result of war. These are groups of all classes.

Can we through education and Christian Endeavor change the thinking of new Canadians and many others, so that they may become law observers and wise law makers?

In our field of Alcohol Education there is much to be done, and do not stop with the children's Scientific Instruction. There are many opinionated young people who disregard their early instruction, but rather pay attention to the advertiser boosters! Some owe their allegiance to the movies, magazines and comic strips so much so that their attitude to the home, church and state reflects this type of education. Temperance truth and Christian citizenship lessons will surely bear fruit, if we do not grow weary in well doing.

Last year I spoke of a Library Project. The one we sponsored gained in interest and in number of books. It was later exchanged with another group of readers. As magazines and papers are becoming scarce owing to war, let us clip items of interest and pass them on, perhaps in the form of a scrap book, or put them into letters, or give them out at meetings. Items on the lives and doings of great men and women, community plans of note, home-making efforts, extracts from sermons, poems and reviews of good books, and do not forget our present day heroes of air, land and sea. Stamp collecting is another way to learn of our country the world and its rulers.

In Manitoba we have a Government extension course in process. There are eight classes at work for a ten weeks' course. I visited one in a small town last week. A large class of girls, 14 to 27 years. They learn cooking, laundry work, hand and machine sewing, knitting and fancy work. They receive lectures on health from nurses and doctors. Take physical drill and learn about many farm pursuits, as well as how to care for the home and children. The Government provides everything and the students pay no tuition fees. What fine Canadianization work! I left with this class some temperance literature, mostly papers. These were received gladly.

A great field for better citizenship is before us. Let us waste no time, but do our part to put down the tyranny of liquor and other wastages of life and show the way to greater freedom. Let us keep our Bible in use and keep the Sabbath Day Holy—that we may be ardent loyal patriots of this our dear Canada.

May I hear from our provinces soon as to what you are doing and please give suggestions for the use of other superintendents.

### U. S. SPEAKS

#### Liquor-Law Enforcement

I am not too old to be sympathetic with the problems of youth, nor yet too young to be unable to remember the days before the world war and prohibition.

For several years I watched the "noble experiment" with growing disfavor, with the certainty in my mind that it had failed. Twice, on each opportunity given me, I voted for repeal and on the day when it arrived as having been the dawn of a new era of property and freedom from gang rule.

Today, I find myself strangely enough convinced that we have been bitterly cheated and fooled though the clever propaganda of men who had millions to spend.

Let me make one prediction — if the women of America do not cease drinking prohibition will not return within three years and this time to stay.

Isn't it? Let me quote one of the leading hotel men of New England, who recently said to me: "Repeal has helped my business and yet I am a raid my conscience would cause me to vote dry tomorrow. I have never seen anything like this craze of women and girls for liquor. It was not so in the olden days. I did not expect it now. We are having no trouble with men drinkers but I am sorry to say we are having it—and plenty of it—with women."

Another thing, we are told there would be no return of the saloon. It is some states the saloon itself has come back in full glory. In others such as our own, places infinitely worse than the old saloon are to be found and five or six of them in every block. Certainly it was never the intention of those of us who honestly voted wet in the belief it would restore prosperity, that soda fountains, grocery stores, candy stores and other similar should sell liquor.

There are more men—and more women—drunk on our streets in one month than in a year past. An omnibus accident is constantly increasing. Our children are being reared in the belief that drunkenness is no sin. Men who took wages home to their families are spending it for booze. Young girls are drunk on the streets. Crime and gang deductions have increased instead of decreasing. The bootlegger is still with us. The millions of revenue we were promised have not materialized and the honest merchant has suffered through inability of men to pay their just debts because their earnings have been spent for liquor.

Truthfully that is the situation today. I voted "wet". I preached it, I talked it, I believed it. But today I am convinced that I was wrong and am willing to admit my error. Dare you do the same? Unless there is actual law enforcement and actual control of liquor and unless our women of today awaken to the peril of their own families, prohibition is coming back and this time it will be no experiment noble or otherwise.

It's not a reformer speaking. I have drunk many a cocktail and shaken many a highball. But today I am through and may I add that from my own conversations with friends, others are with me and that both great political parties should heed the warning in the skies and take an active stand for real liquor law enforcement before we again find our so-called liberties taken from us.

## Weekly Live Stock Market Report

**SASKATOON Fat Stock** had sales of 524 head, ranging from \$7.50 to \$12.25, averaging \$8.40. Stockers sold mostly from \$3.75 to \$6.85.

**MARITIME** markets steady to strong, good to choice steers making \$8.50 to \$9.50.

### SHEEP AND LAMB MARKETS

**TORONTO** spring lamb prices eased 25 cents as the receipts of this commodity increased, and settled at \$13 to \$13.25 for choice, with other grades downward to \$10. Sheep, however, held steady at \$3 to \$6.

**MONTREAL** sold spring lambs on a weight basis for the first time this year at \$10 to \$12 per cwt. Sheep ranged between \$4.50 and \$6.50, with the majority \$5.50 to \$6.

**WINDSOR** had a light trade in lambs, with a few good spring lambs clearing strong up to \$12.50. **CALGARY** had a few yearling lambs at \$9 and a few springers \$10.50 to \$11.25.

**PRINCE ALBERT** lamb prices were easier, with springers at \$9.50 to \$10.50 and some plain lambs at \$6.50 to \$7.

**MOOSE JAW** had only a handful of spring lambs at \$10.75, some good heavies at \$7.50, and common feeder kinds \$6 to \$7.

**SASKATOON** paid \$10 to \$11.50 for spring lambs and \$7.50 to \$8.50 for yearlings. Sheep sold between \$5 and \$7.75.

**VANCOUVER** had a fair offering of a sheep and lambs. Spring lambs commanded \$10 to \$11, yearlings \$3, good heavy ewes \$6, and common sheep \$4.
