**Funeral Of Accident Victim On Tuesday**  
The funeral of Mr. Frank Keefe, 72 year old Rollo Bay accident victim who died of injuries in the Charlottetown Hospital on Friday last, was held on Tuesday afternoon from his late residence. It was announced yesterday. The funeral, originally planned for yesterday, was postponed to Tuesday to await arrival of relatives from the mainland.  
Mr. Keefe was fatally injured last week when his horse drawn vehicle was struck by a motor truck operated by Eldon McKenzie, Souris.  
The driver of the truck was exonerated from blame for the accident by a coroner's jury which heard evidence at an inquest last Friday evening. Coroner Dr. Roy's verdict was that the driver recommended a life hedge along the road where the accident occurred be removed.

**First Exhibitors' Building Completed at New York for 1939 World's Fair.**

NEW YORK, N. Y., Oct. 15 — Flaga of the great nations were raised over the New York World's Fair today when the first of the exhibitors' buildings was completed. It is a huge dome, towering 90 feet and 150 feet in diameter, and will be occupied by the H. J. Heinz Company.

Grover Whalen, president of the Fair Corporation, members of his staff and others were the guests of Howard Heinz, president of the Heinz Company, at a luncheon at the Fair Grounds, after the party had inspected the building.

Resembling a bee hive, the Heinz dome is in harmony with the theme architecture of the Fair buildings, already developed in the sphere and trylon. It is supported by nineteen columns, arranged in symmetrical lines. Startling light effects have been devised and the curvature of the interior will be flooded with light by the use of fluorescent tubes. Twenty thousand square feet of floor space are crowned by the dome, which will be a landmark at the Fair. Sixty million visitors are expected.

**RELIGIOUS SERVICES**

**ST. JAMES' CHURCH**  
The sacrament of Holy Communion was celebrated at St. James' Presbyterian Church yesterday morning. In the evening the Rev. Dr. R. Moorhead Legate spoke on what was meant by following Jesus. He took as his text, St. Matthew 4:19, "He said unto them, follow me, and straightway they left their nets and followed him." The special music at the evening service consisted of an anthem by the choir—"Rock of Ages."

**TRINITY UNITED CHURCH**  
At the morning service of Trinity United Church the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered. A very large congregation was present to partake of the Sacrament. The Communion sermon was preached by Rev. Hugh Millar. Speaking from Matthew 13:3, "Behold a sower went forth to sow," the minister centred his remarks about the theme, "The Responsibility of Response." The course of his sermon, Rev. Millar said that the removal of present day evils, and the incoming of the Kingdom of God, depended, not so much on the sower, Jesus, nor on the Word which he taught, but on the response of Christian people to the Word when it is received.  
Rev. L. M. Murray brought the message at the evening worship. His theme, based on John 4:24, "God is a spirit, and they that worship Him must worship Him in spirit and in truth," was "Every Man's Religion His Own." Rev. Mr. Murray pointed out that a deep, firm, personal religion is the only thing that can give strength in adversity and lasting and abiding joy.  
The choir gave a fine rendition of a special selection at each service, and in the evening Mrs. Roy Cudmore sang Handel's "Spirit Divine" in a very pleasing manner. Mr. A. Roy Kendall, L. R. A. M., presided at the organ.

**CENTRAL CHRISTIAN CHURCH**  
A large congregation worshipped in the Central Christian Church on the Lord's Day morning and the listened to a well presented sermon on "What I Believe About Man." The text was John 8:11 where Jesus said, "Woman neither do I condemn thee, go and sin no more."  
Jesus in his teachings began not with God but with man, said the minister. In the New Testament worship of God was not the most important but bringing our gifts to the altar when we are right with our brother; love of God did not come first, in the Christian economy, but love of our neighbor.
