ARRIVALS from the Island have not been large this season. This is due in part to the delay on the part of the farmers in marketing their produce and in part to the increased shipments up the St. Lawrence due to the high prices paid at Montreal and points west. Sellers are asking 40 cents today ex vessel for potatoes but some sales were made at 38 cents. Oats are unchanged at 41 to 43 cents. The market is overstocked with turnips, nearly as many coming as of potatoes.—Maritime Grocer.

An incident which almost amounted to a case of piracy occurred at the wharf below the bridge last Saturday night. A couple of youths, bubbling over with the exuberance produced by remaining too long at the bottle, boarded one of the P. E. I. fleet laden with the produce of that fertile island, and casting her adrift, prepared in true sailor fashion to man and sail the ship. Fortunately the area of water being so limited, nothing was shattered but the nerves of the badly frightened crew as they crouched in the forecastle in blank terror at the noise and wonderment of the mischief happening on deck in the still small hours of the night.—New Glasgow Chronicle.
