 GRAIN LETTER.
 (From F. B. McCurdy & Co's Private Wire.)
 CHICAGO, Dec. 16.—Wheat—The principal feature today was the dullness accompanied by very narrow fluctuations. The southwest is still dry but receipts double last year. The Northwestern stocks are accumulating rapidly. European market are mixed, partly higher and partly lower. The world's shipments are expected to be lighter than last week but larger than last year. According to our way of figuring consumption and requirements of this country in general, and taking it for granted that our exports from now on until the end of the season will not be larger (more likely lighter) than last year. Our carry over into the next crop will amount to about 124,000,000 or 40,000,000 more than last year.
 Corn—Easier on liquidation by scattered longs. According to the Government figures, we raised 363,000,000 more than last year and 119,000,000 more than the largest crop ever before raised. The grading of recent arrivals has been extremely poor. We just received a cable from Argentine saying that rain is much wanted in the corn belt.
 Oats—Easier, steady deliveries on December contracts which have weakened that month somewhat.
 Provisions—Higher at the opening on shortage in western hog receipts compared with a year ago. On the bulge there was a good deal of stuff for sale which resulted in a downward reaction.

TELEPHONE SERVICE FOR DISPATCHING TRAINS

ST. JOHN, Dec. 16.—Following the successful operation of train despatching by telephone on other portions of the system, instead of telegraph, the C. P. R. has decided to install a telephone line between this city and McAdam Junction and will commence despatching its trains by this method in the coming spring.
 William Downie, general superintendent of the Atlantic division, said yesterday morning in answer to a query from a reporter regarding a rumor that a telephone system was to be established, that the company had decided to put in a line from here to McAdam and to operate their trains in this way. He added that the work would be undertaken soon and men would be sent out to put up the wires for the service.
 It is not likely that the inauguration of the telephone system will affect the telegraphers at present employed by the company as they will be kept on as operators of the telephone. The telephone is said to have proved very successful wherever it has been adopted. The telegraph lines will be kept up for use in an emergency and for this reason it will be necessary to have men who can operate a telegraph key as well as the telephone.

CLOSING STOCK LETTER.

(From F. B. McCurdy & Co's Private Wire.)
 NEW YORK, Dec. 16.—Randolph says—There was no change in the character of the trading in the last hour. Reading, Union Pacific and Steel showed a little strength at times, and moved up slightly. Interboros reacted formally from the highest range of the day but continued the most active feature of the trading. The tone at the close was dull with the majority of issues ranging fractionally above yesterday's close. Governments unchanged, other Bonds strong. The most noteworthy fact about the market is the improvement in bonds which at this time seems to be legitimate and not due to the operation of dealers. There is a small growing inquiry on the part of the public for high trade investment securities which is as it should be if we are about to have a revival of an investment demand which is always the precursor of a better condition of affairs in the stock market.

CLOSING COTTON LETTER.

(From F. B. McCurdy & Co's Private Wire.)
 NEW YORK, Dec. 16.—It has been a very quiet market with every one waiting for fresh developments on the gaining report next Tuesday. For one reason or another, the situation fails to inspire general bull speculation. In the absence of bull speculation the market is sustained by trade demand without any effort to discount or eliminate scarcity of supply and prohibitive values such as indicated by the statistical position and crop prospects. Liverpool cables were barely up to expectations and the local market opened unchanged to two pts. lower. It sold off a little in the morning but rallied and during the later trading ruled within a point or two of last night's final. There was no particular feature of the trading standpoint. Advances from the south continue bullish as to the spot situation, and future ginnings. Southern spot markets officially reported were unchanged to one sixteenth of a cent higher following the comparatively large figures of yesterday. Exports continue heavy and so far are about 490,000 bales ahead of last season. Spinners takings this week were about 25,000 bales ahead of last years. The Government estimates the East Indian crop at 4,688,000 bales of the actual out-turn of last year of 4,502,000 bales and last years commercial crop of 5,252,000 bales including the item of 750,000 bales for home consumption.
