they were "netted" and marketed literally in hundreds. The geese were threatened with actual extinction, and would undoubtedly have met the same fate as the passenger pigeons, who formerly in their flight southward darkened the sky for miles along the Mississippi and today are a rare species.

The beneficial effect of the act is seen in this Province, Mr. Colbran states, where the increase in game birds is encouraging. At Alberton there is now a rookery of the variety known as Esquimaux Curlew and there are encouraging signs in other places.

The legitimate hours of shooting birds at this season are not as carefully observed as they might be and it is an important part of the duties of the officers of the Department to see that these laws are more rigorously enforced. Geese can only be shot one hour before sunrise and not later than one hour after sunset. Recently Mr. Colbran brought before Magistrate J. C. McDonald at Victoria the captain and mate of a Sydney schooner who had been hunting geese after hours and were fined \$10 without costs, but with strict warning against repeating the offence.

Only Indians and Esquimaux are allowed to do any spring shooting, and this is confined to "scoters." Under no circumstances are they permitted to kill geese or ducks in the spring, and the "scoters" are not to be marketed.  
 Data on the migration of birds is being compiled by means of a new method, originated by Mr. Jack Miner of Essex County, Ontario, and put into effect successfully by the Biological Society at Washington. The method is known as the banding system, a small aluminum band, with an individual number, being placed on the bird's foot. Any person shooting or picking up a bird so marked is requested to send details to Ottawa or Washington as to its condition and where found. This has already supplied a wonderful amount of valuable information on the migratory habits of birds.

Next to the red squirrel, there is no more harmful pest than the English sparrow and Mr. Colbran states that the Government wish to encourage the elimination of this species as much as possible. We have in this Province several harmless varieties, including the chipping sparrow, the white crowned sparrow, the ordinary song sparrow and the vesper sparrow. No progress can be made in attracting other birds about a house or farm while the English sparrow is about, and this species forms about seventy percent of the sparrow family in this Province. Some people use poison to eliminate them but this is dangerous to other birds, such as warblers, finches, humming birds, cat birds and

today, although it would not be expected to be of long duration. If the Conservatives decide to carry on under or by Chamberlain, it is thought that a contentious legislature could be avoided until such time as all parties should have had an opportunity of establishing themselves upon a new footing.  
 This new footing, according to the best informed may be a Liberal-Conservative coalition, although Liberal leaders at present declare this is impossible. There is little hope, however, of avoiding another general election before twelve months have passed.

The provisional date for the assembly of Parliament has been set for January 8th, but it is expected the meeting will be postponed until February. One thing is certain, the British public are disgusted with the instability of the three-party system, and it is considered not unlikely that, should the Liberals precipitate another election in the comparatively near future, the result will not be a gain for them, but a Labor Government.

**LONDON, Dec. 9.**—The legal profession returns to Westminster stronger than ever and the legal representatives belong to all parties. The Labor party possesses three Kings Council.

**BELFAST, Dec. 9.**—T. J. S. Harbison, Nationalist and Cahrl Heakey Sinn Fein were elected to the Imperial parliament for seats representing Counties Tyrone and Fermanagh. Healy is at present in prison.

**LONDON, Dec. 9.**—While various leaders and press organs of the three big parties are loudly proclaiming that they will not enter any coalition it is self evident that only by some sort of a union can the King's Government be carried on without resort to another general election. This no one desires immediately. It is only on financial grounds as it is estimated the elections in the neighborhood of a million and a half pounds, it is assumed as an almost certainty that Baldwin will resign but beyond that everything is still speculative. If the Conservatives decide to carry on the Government must be under the Earl of Derby or some statesman not strongly committed to the protec-
