...*The following is taken from the Malden, Mass. News of the 14th. Mrs. Jones referred to is a native of Georgetown, being a daughter of Captain Daniel Walker of the Brant, Rats and matches is the supposed cause of a \$500 fire yesterday afternoon at the house, 206 Cross St., owned by Dr. Victor Bychower and occupied by A. E. Jones and family and the fire was attended with considerable excitement, including the rescue of Mrs. Arthur Leslie Jones, who was in confinement, and her removal to the hospital of Miss Blanche York at Maplewood and also the rescue of Mrs. G. H. Bennett of 230 Belmont St., who was assisting at the house and was nearly overcome by smoke. An alarm of fire was given from box 33, nearly half a mile from the fire and while the auto chemical had first been called to the place by a still alarm, the rest of the apparatus was considerably delayed. The interior of the building was badly gutted and the loss upon it is fixed at \$400 and \$100 on the furniture. Mrs. Jones was in bed in her chamber and the other occupants were in another part of the house. They smelled wood burning for some time but thought it was outside. Suddenly, they say, the flames came up between the floor in Mrs. Jones' room, and she considerably weakened from the nature of her illness was able after some difficulty to secure the aid of her husband and mother-in-law. The husband wrapped her in a comforter and removed her to Dr. Bychower's. Some one then ran to Suffolk Sq. for the fire alarm box and a phone message was sent to Chemical 1. The latter had a stream of water on when the horse apparatus arrived and a second stream was laid. The firemen were there about an hour and had much trouble in reaching the fire between the floors and walls and the blind attic. Volumes of smoke poured from the place. Willing hands assisted in removing the furniture and it was here that Mrs. Bennett, a sister of Mrs. Jones Sr., was nearly overcome. She revived when brought into the air by the firemen. Dr. Lougee was called and he ordered Mrs. A. L. Jones' removal to Miss York's hospital. Today she is reported as improving though yesterday was regarded as the most critical time of her sickness.

OUT THIS OUT AND PASTE IT UP.

Almost every day The Guardian receives orders by mail to insert news matter of an advertising nature. Only a few weeks ago we inserted one or more times advertisement of Farm or Sale by the Guardian. In this connection it may be said that the subscription price is not sufficient to even pay the actual cost of paper, ink, presswork, mailing, bookkeeping and other expenses of the Circulation department proper, and thus subscribers have no privileges of free advertising and are on the same footing as non-subscribers.
