SEED POTATO ACREAGE. - Applications entered for seed potato inspection as of Tuesday afternoon totalled 3,600 and comprised some 23,570 acres, S. C. Peppin, chief inspector of seed certification for the Province informed the Guardian. As applications will be accepted until the end of the week Mr. Peppin predicted that the seed potato acreage would equal that of last year, but that the overall acreage would likely be down by ten percent. Last year 4600 growers entered 36,500 acres for inspection. This year, however, Mr. Peppin stated, a lot of the growers only started planting this week due to the fact that there were some wet sections of land on their fields. So far, Mr. Peppin said, the Department had received no complaints of set rot due to wet weather. There had, however, been a few cases reported of injury due to wine-worm. In concluding Mr. Peppin stated that with good weather the crops should come along very rapidly.

NEW YORK - Filled with many interesting new ideas, the showing of Maximilian furs yesterday at the Plaza Hotel was marked by helmets that dipped to the new longer length. An opulent sweep and fullness in the manipulation of fur and a rounded, curved or spiral line ran throughout the collection.

Labrador mink appeared opulent in a long loose coat. Another flowing line coat was of nutria in a tawny champagne shade. For luxury with a casual air, beige and snowy white ermine were fashioned into cardigan jackets with sleeves pushed up.

Sleeves took the spotlight, with many interesting new manipulations. Full and loose but not flared, some turned back into thick cuffs. Another version was full and puffed from shoulder to elbow, with the sleeves fitting tightly from the elbow to a trim little cuff.

Collars rose high from the shoulders in tuliplike cups or folded down in pointed or rounded tabs. Dressmaker touches, such as velvet lining the high collar or a sweeping black Persian coat or taffeta facing the tuxedo revers on a short box jacket, lent individuality.

Asymmetric closings were seen frequently. This treatment was used on an ermine weskit with rhinestone buttons lighting a diagonal line to the waist.

STYLE COIFFURE TO SUIT FACE

How many of you consider the shape of your face when you do your hair or select a new hair style? You should consider the shape of your face and select a hair style that really flatters and one that you can do at home, yourself says Lois Leeds.

Of course you want to look as attractive as possible. "What woman doesn't?" you ask. Well judging by the unbecoming hairdos which some of you select, they don't! Consider your face from every angle - front, side and center. Is yours the ideal - the oval face? If so you can wear the latest whim of fashion and still look lovely. But even so there are certain styles that do the most for you. The oval face looks best with the "pretty" type of hairdo.

The round face needs careful study. If it's a young round face you can wear rather extreme up-swept hairdos - the sleek, high roll, the high-on-the-one-side and the exciting upswept sides and back. If you are a bit on the mature side, the round face needs a bit of softening of the hairline, but UP and off the face. This "upsweep" tends to "lift" the heavy chin line.

The long face demands soft width across the front, a little width at the sides and low arrangement at the back. The big "bun" is the perfect style because the long face is usually accompanied by a long neck. If your hair isn't long, wear an artificial "bun" caught up near the crown.

The square face needs a hair style with "broken" lines to soften the square look. Irregular wave patterns, parted on the side, never in the middle. Look at yourself carefully and shape your hair until it takes on the design that you want. Keep the hair off the face and off the neck.

The wide-at-the-forehead, pointed-at-chin face is called very prettily, the heart-shape and so, to widen the lower half of the face is your aim, or should be. Irregular bangs, braids and unusual styles are very becoming. The Page style must have been revived just for the beautification of the heart-shaped face!
