Mr. McNevin objected to the passage of the bill on the ground that the Orphanage was under the control and direction of a Board of Trustees and that the bill should not be passed without their consent. The trustees are, he said, unanimously opposed to the passage of the bill. Mr. McLure said that in view of the statements of Mr. McNevin and others, he would not press the bill to a vote of the committee. On motion of Mr. McNevin the Speaker took the chair—no disposing of the bill for the present session.

On motion of Mr. McLean the Church Union Bill was referred back to committee of the whole House for further consideration. Mr. Maynard McDonald in the chair. Mr. McLean explained that it was proposed to make certain amendments to the last clause of the last section of the bill as passed in committee. The amendment was adopted and the clause now reads: "(a) To investigate the circumstances under which the votes were taken under the Federal Church Union Act and examine in case of dispute, the congregational property within this Province of the uniting churches and non-concurring congregations, and to report to the

first session of the Legislature held after the passing of this Act what amendments and additions, if any, should be made to this Act in order to make an equitable adjustment and division of the congregational properties concerned."

On motion of Mr. Hunter the bill to Incorporate the Belfast Hall Company was read a third time and passed.

On motion of Mr. McLure the bill to further amend the Act to incorporate the Prince Edward Island Protestant Orphanage was read a third time and passed.

On motion of Mr. Maynard McDonald, the bill to incorporate the Trustees of the Murray River Cemeteries was read a third time and passed.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Stewart the Bill respecting the Registration of Shares in the Capital Stock of Extra Provincial Associations was read a third time and passed.

Hon. Mr. Myers moved the passage of the following resolution: "WHEREAS the Dominion of Canada, Department of Agriculture, Health of Animals Branch has by Order in Council dated December 11th, 1922 made regulation regarding the eradication of Bovine Tuberculosis from Restricted Areas.

"AND WHEREAS Prince Edward Island offers exceptional geographical advantages as a Restricted Area.

"THEREFORE RESOLVED that this Provincial Legislature now in session heartily approve of the Restricted Area policy, and direct the Minister of Agriculture to take the necessary steps with the Health of Animals Branch, Ottawa in order to have the Province of Prince Edward Island declared a Restricted Area."

He said that not more than two per cent of the cattle of the Province would "go down" under the test. The Dominion Government will assist in making the test; but it requires a two-thirds vote of the Stock Breeders of the Province in favor of it; and for that purpose cards to be marked for or against would be issued from the various schools throughout the country.

Mr. Irving seconded the resolution. No one, he said, could estimate the valuable effects on this Province if it were a "restricted area" as proposed. He expressed the opinion that the resolution should enlist the sympathy and support of the people. The Federal government will assist in the establishment of a restricted area. If it be decided to have this Island a "restricted area" for the eradication of tuberculosis, Mr. McArthur suggested that there might be some objections. Hon. Mr. Myers said that every cow in the Province would be subjected to the test. If that were an objection it would have to be considered. But he believed that every reasonable farmer would concur in the movement proposed. Mr. Saunders favored the resolution. He thought that every one would be in sympathy with the movement.
