FRANCE ANNEXES LAND IN TIEN-TSIN.

PEKING, October 22.—A square mile of territory adjoining the French concession at Tien-tsin has been forcibly seized by the French Consul, with the assistance of troops. The Chinese police were arrested, and Frenchmen were substituted for them. Replying to a protest from the Chinese Foreign Office, the French Legation at Peking said that it assumed the responsibility for any consequences that might flow from the action.

The district occupied by the French is thickly populated, and the Chinese are threatening violence, as they have annexation to the French concession, and in its protest to the French Legation the Foreign Office gave warning that it would not be responsible if violence ensued.

The Chinese press violently assails the action of the French, declaring that it "surpasses Japanese tactics and its actual warfare against defenceless China."

Tien-tsin is the port of Peking, and has a population of some 750,000. The French concession in Tien-tsin is situated on the eastern bank of the Haiho, and prior to its present extension was about one and a half miles long by half a mile wide. To the south of the French concession lies the British, while to the north are the Italian and Japanese settlements.

In 1901 after the Boer uprising in Russia, Belgium, Italy and Austria-Hungary all appropriated large areas on the left bank of the Haiho for future settlements, while the British, French and Russian concessions extended their boundaries very considerably.

The territory that has been taken by the French was the sole remaining district inhabited by natives, and its seizure by the French probably means that the Chinese section will be entirely eliminated from the foreign area.

Spends \$2,000,000 Daily in America

Chancellor of Exchequer's Statement that Great Britain has to Provide this Amount Disputed.

LONDON, Oct. 23.—The statement of Reginald McKenna, Chancellor of the Exchequer that Great Britain had to find \$2,000,000 a day for every working day for civilians in America, goes unchallenged. It literally means that America receives one-third of Britain's war expenditure, but Great Britain is financing practically all the Allies' imports of munitions, and provisions for use of the military and for civilians. The figures probably include a considerable proportion of the payments to Canada made through New York.

The Chancellor, declared that the expenditures were not diminishing. There was, in fact, an increase in the amounts paid for munitions and in advance to the Allies, he said, but he did not suppose the expenditure at the present rate would last long. He said this season of the year was the period of heaviest expenditure on this point. The Chancellor is corroborated by the foreign trade balance of the United States.

NICKEL IS SAFEGUARDED.

LONDON, October 23.—Our correspondent in London writes: "I have been granted an interview by Lord Robert Cecil, Under-Secretary of Foreign Affairs, regarding an interview to the American press that certain amounts of nickel emanating from allied territory which were dispatched to the United States and ultimately found their way into Germany on board the submarine Dentschland were British Government property. This in no way referred to nickel from Canada and that he had no intention whatever of criticising the arrangements for controlling Canadian nickel or suggesting that any Canadian nickel reaches the enemy. The British Government is entirely satisfied with the precautions taken and arrangements made by the Canadian Government with regard to nickel."

Viceregal Party Reaches England

OTTAWA, Oct. 21.—T. N. Doody, a director of the Civil Service Club was suspended today and is understood that Eugene Primeau of the Board of Railway Commissioners is also to be suspended. He is also a director of the club.

Driven to a most unusual money making scheme on account of practical bankruptcy, the Civil Service Club of Ottawa now finds itself facing a very serious situation. So serious, indeed, that the government has seen fit to suspend from the club service the secretary, Mr. Edward A. Miles, of the Customs department the latter being the son of W. A. Fraser, of the agricultural department the latter being the son of Auditor General Fraser.

The whole affair is developing into a sensation, and is the talk in the town today. On street corners in hotel lobbies, everywhere groups of men are talking the matter over. Coercion of big concerns by employees of the government of their agents is the charge made.

In the case of the Civil Service Club, the members, in a desperate attempt to increase its membership, and incidentally save itself from bankruptcy, engaged one F. L. Ebbetts, a promoter of Toronto and former resident of the States, to launch a membership campaign. The scheme was to solicit life membership at \$250 each, and it has been stated that of each \$250 Ebbetts was to get \$125 according to the agreement. The scheme itself looked alright, but the method of procedure is what has caused the trouble and incidentally the suspension of two of the officials.

It is understood that Ebbetts represented himself as belonging to one or other department of the service. The scheme worked well and might still be working well if it had not been for an assistant of Ebbetts, named Hood, who was working in Montreal. Hood approached one big concern which could not see the advantage of joining the club. The canvasser is alleged to have told the manager that in his dealings with the Customs department his refusal would do him any good.

Hood spilled the beans when he mentioned the name of the secretary of the club for the head of the firm in question reported the matter to Hon. Dr. Reid. Miles was immediately suspended and Fraser's suspension followed last evening. Then a cabinet committee, composed of Hon. Dr. Reid, Hon. Martin Burroll, and Hon. Arthur Meighen was formed to investigate the whole affair. The investigation was continued this morning in Honor. Mr. Meighen's office, when it is understood, of other officials of the club were on the carpet.

The members of the club executive disavow Hood and his works. They say the life membership campaign was instituted alright as a business proposition, but deny any knowledge of the failure of people being threatened or intimidated into joining. The actual canvassing was left to the outsiders, who apparently represented themselves as departmental officials and followed the course they thought would produce the best results.

The inquiry yesterday it was learned that about \$6,000 had come in, and more cheques were due. It is understood that the canvassers had a line on two hundred and fifty members netted the club about \$50,000. The scheme would have been profitable both for the club and the canvassers.

GRAND COLLAPSE OF FOE FORSEEN

HALIFAX, N. S., Oct. 23.—From the steamship that brought them safely through the war zone there were landed here on Thursday about eight hundred of all ranks from the battle fronts, from hospitals and discharging stations on the other side. About six hundred of them were wounded and non-eligible, the great many having been out physically unfit after they reached the other side.

They left for their destinations in two special trains in the afternoon. "Canada will have to send more men, and yet more men. The boys over there are calling for them."

Such were the words of Captain H. Dansereau, a French-Canadian officer who landed with other wounded comrades. Captain Dansereau in the fighting at Courselette, was what he described as "lucky" for his only injury was a severe shrapnel wound on the knee. He has a furrow of two months and hopes to be back in the trenches in time for Christmas dinner.

Time for Action.

In an interview he said: "We were stationed at the Ypres salient when the order came late in August that we must get ready to participate in a general attack on the Somme. There was not a man among us but knew what such an order meant. We had been complaining more or less about periods of inactivity, but now we knew we would have action enough to suit the most adventurous."

"We were started off on an eleven-day tramp and placed in reserve. It was on the morning of the 16th of September that the Germans made an attack on the front line of the British forces and succeeded in gaining a foothold. We were sent in for a counter-attack and then it was that our French-Canadian comrades saw what stuff we dug in and held. Our artillery kept pounding away and the way the boys with the big guns supported us made

our hearts glad. Bit by bit, day by day, we fought on, losing many men every day, but constantly moving forward. Then came the rush for Courselette, and you know what our boys did as well as I do, for I was soon out of it with this knee."

It was encouraging to hear Captain Dansereau talk of the immense superiority of the Allies' air power. His eyes sparkled with pride of his race as he told of the dare-devil exploits of some of the French aviators. He did not belittle the bravery of the Germans. In the trenches they fought like demons, he said, but out in the open and away from their commanding officers they were greatly inferior to the fighting men of Canada, who never show to such great advantage as when given an opportunity to take individual initiative. The Germans, he added, were discouraged. They are really on the run. It will discourage them more when they learn that more and more Canadians are coming along to take the place of the boys who fell at Courselette. Some day there will be a grand collapse and they will be crying for mercy as a nation, like so many of their individual soldiers now cry when they see our lads coming at them on the run.
