He would only say: "I spent only about one tenth of that."

EGGS FROM CHINA TO UNITED STATES.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 24.—Six hundred cases of eggs from Shanghai, China, were included in the cargo of the liner Siberia, which arrived last week from the Orient. These eggs were admitted duty free under the new tariff act.

Under the five-cent tariff 4,000 cases of Chinese eggs were received in San Francisco last year. Local merchants say the total importation will reach 30,000 cases during the ensuing year.

FRUIT GROWERS MEET

FREDERICTON, Jan. 22.—The ninth annual meeting of the New Brunswick Fruit Growers' Association opened this morning at the Council Chamber, City Hall, with a fairly large attendance, notwithstanding the heavy storm of yesterday which has blocked many of the country roads.

Acting President Vroom delivered his annual address, and Mr. A. G. Turney, as the secretary, made his annual report, showing the internal work of the association. Mr. S. B. Hatheway complimented the association upon having such an energetic secretary and upon his motion a vote of thanks was passed to Mr. Turney.

Mayor Hooper on behalf of the citizens of Fredericton welcomed the Fruit Growers of Fredericton, spoke of the growing importance of the industry which they represent and paid tribute to the late C. Gilman, who had been prominent in the affairs of the association until his death. His Worship also traced the growth of the fruit exhibits at the Fredericton Exhibition, as indicative of the growth of the industry.

After Chairman Vroom had thanked the Mayor for his attendance, the business of the meeting was taken up. A committee composed of Messrs. Peters, Hatheway, Gilman and Turney were named to take into consideration the report on the amended conditions under which apples are to be placed on the market. The election of officers was deferred until a report is obtained from the nominating committee, Messrs. S. B. Hatheway, S. L. Peters, J. W. Clark and James Barnes. Delegates to the Fruit Conference were elected by ballot and Messrs. C. N. Vroom, S. B. Hatheway and Wm. Gilman were elected as delegates, with Messrs. Clark, Smith and Wilnot as substitutes.

There was a general discussion of the conditions under which fruit is placed on the market and Mr. Henry Wilnot delivered his annual report as treasurer, the report being referred to Messrs. S. L. Peters and Charles Fulton, as an audit committee. The convention is in progress again this afternoon and this evening there will be an illustrated lecture at the Assembly Hall in the Normal School building.

FOUR ECLIPSES TO TAKE PLACE THIS YEAR

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 26.—Four eclipses, two of the sun and two of the moon are to take place during the present year. The first is scheduled for one month from tomorrow. It will be an annular eclipse of the sun, invisible in North America. The only persons who will have an opportunity to view it at all will be the residents in the most southern parts of Patagonia and New Zealand, and they will see it only as a small partial eclipse.

During the second week of March there will be a partial eclipse of the moon, which will be visible in practically every part of the United States and Canada. In August will come a total eclipse of the sun, which will be visible as a small partial eclipse in Eastern Canada and the New England States. On September 3rd and 4th there will be a partial eclipse of the moon, which will be visible in the far western part of the United States and Canada.

PROS. TALK ABOUT SEVEN MEN TEAMS

OTTAWA, Jan. 24.—The question of reverting to seven man hockey will be reviewed at the next meeting of the National Association. Secretary Martin Rosenthal, of the Ottawas, states that he is more than ever dissatisfied with the present system. He argues that officials do not draw the line tight enough in the matter of major fouls and that the majority of players are allowed to escape with warnings after committing deliberate attacks on players. Mr. Rosenthal adds that Ottawa clubs has not abandoned hope of hearing of the seven man game in vogue again and will take the matter up before the executive of the N. H. A. He contends that the only way to eliminate the rough work is to impose heavy penalties and abolish the lines thus putting it up to the clubs themselves to punish the players who handicap their chances through being banished.

Percy Lesueur favors a continuation of the six man hockey, but would go back to the old penalty system. He would cut out the minor fouls and send all offenders off the ice for periods of two, five and ten minutes, forcing the teams to play with men shy. This, he says, would have the effect of checking the strenuous play, as the teams would be heavily handicapped in the six man game with one or two men shy. Lesueur says that the present rules are so complicated that it is impossible for the officials to please the spectators, who do not understand the rules. Ronnan and Darragh favor Lesueur's idea.

"Here is a game which shows up one of the weaknesses of six-man hockey," remarked Referee Ernie Butterworth, of Ottawa, during the Ontario-Canadian game here Saturday night. "Ontarios played sensational hockey at Ottawa and deserved to win the game on the play, but the effort took it all out of them, and the result is the spasmodic efforts they are making tonight to get going again. This six-man stuff is a killer."

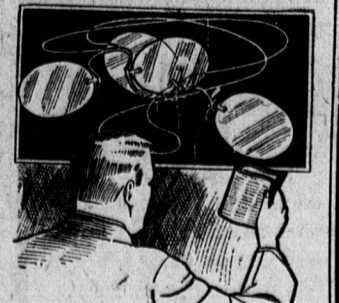
