THINK LIFE IS NOW EXTINGUISHED AT MARS

LONDON, October 30—Fresh changes of an extraordinary nature are reported in Mars by the Journal of the British Astronomical Association.

The planet of mystery during September was nearer the earth than at any time since 1892, and a favorable position for observation. The phenomena observed, says the Journal, are altogether without parallel in the records of the past. Vast changes have transformed the appearance of Mars' dusky areas; a gloomy yellow veil has enshrouded the immense tracts of the Martian surface, obliterating the markings.

The changes now in progress on the surface of Mars are of extraordinary interest in view of the theory developed by Professor Lowell that Mars is inhabited by a race of living beings. He argues that the canal of Mars are works constructed by a dying race, menaced by starvation on a desert planet, to carry water supplied by melting ice caps on the poles to the

waterless areas near the equator, and thus raise food. It is suggested that if the markings have covered immense tracts of surface there must be some catastrophe on a gigantic scale, some cataclysm such as dwarfs the most violent earthquakes known on our planet.

Synopsis of Canadian North West Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, who has secured a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta, the amount must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of the homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land, each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a tract of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$300 per acre. Duties. Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$300 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$3000.
