—ISLAND LADY DEAD.—Deen Bloom was cast over the community of Bellevue, P. E. I., when a telegram came from Westford, Mass., stating that Mrs. Annie Campbell had died there of pneumonia on April 22nd, 1918, aged 65 years. Mrs. Campbell was the eldest daughter of the late George and Ann Crosby, and had lived in Bellevue the greater part of her life. She was a life member of the W. M. S. and at one time treasurer of the Bellevue Auxiliary. She leaves to mourn two sons in the Canadian Northwest, one brother in Manitoba and a sister in Westford, Mass., a whose home she died. The deceased lady was possessed of sterling qualities, her character being an unusual combination of strength and sweetness. Her life was an exemplary one, as was the Master's. Whom she loved and served so faithfully, in doing good to others; and all who were privileged to know her loved and respected her fully. The funeral service was held Saturday, April 27th, in the Bellevue Methodist church, and from there the remains were conveyed to the family burial plot. Owing to the bad state of the roads the friends from a distance could not attend, notwithstanding that there was a large funeral. The choir was composed of a quartette of voices, and a favorite hymn of Mrs. Campbell's, "In the Secret of His Presence," was sung as a solo by Thomas Moyle. Rev. Mr. Ayers, who conducted the service, based his remarks on "Blessed Are the Dead Who Die in the Lord." In a clear practical discourse he urged upon his hearers to prepare for Heaven by living the consecrated life here. The pall bearers were Thomas Atkinson, Jesse Schurman, Thomas Wright, J. W. Wright, F. W. Davison and John Davison.

FUNERAL MRS. GAVIN, HELD TUESDAY.

The following is taken from a Cashmere, Wash. paper of Feb. 21st:

The funeral of Mrs. Agness Gavin was held at the Presbyterian Church, Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. McCarty, the pastor, preaching a very sympathetic sermon. This was the first death to occur in this community for the new year and chronicles the life of one of the older citizens of Christian character, beloved by all who knew her. She was a kind, loving, indulgent mother, whose memory will always be a bright spot in the darkness.

Six weeks prior to the day of her burial, she was operated upon at the Deaconess Hospital, Wenatchee, and although her recovery was slow and she remained in a weakened condition, it was thought she would soon be convalescent. The church was filled with friends and neighbors paying a last tribute of respect.

The Royal Neighbors of which Miss Ethel Gavin and Mrs. Charles Burbank, are members, attended in a body breaking ranks at the church entrance, through which the funeral cortege passed upon entering and leaving the church.

A quartette composed of Mesdames George Sussex, W. H. Mills, Charles Palmer and Miss Mary Richards sang "Safe in the Arms of Jesus," "Some day the Silver Chord will break" and "Asleep in Jesus," accompanied by Mrs. J. S. Richards, Messrs. Clark Burdick, M. C. McKelton, O. M. Lorraine, Charles Farrow, J. F. Angler, and Jesse Cook acted as pall bearers.

There were many beautiful floral offerings, tokens of esteem from friends and Societies.

The burial took place in the Cashmere Cemetery, where she was laid to rest beside her husband who died about ten years ago and son James, whose death occurred eight years ago. Agness Horne was born in Ontario, July 21, 1859 and was a daughter of the late Robert H. and Sarah Horne, and when a child moved with her parents to Bloomfield, Prince Edward Island, where she was married early in life to William Gavin. The first son, James, was born there. In the year 1881 the family removed to Concrete, North Dakota, where they resided nearly 20 years and where their other children were born. In 1902 they came to Cashmere where the family home is now.

She leaves to mourn her four sons and three daughters: Mrs. Fred. M. Berry, of Wenatchee; Robert and William of Brewster; Mrs. Chas. H. Burbank of Dryden; George, Garfield and Ethel Mae, who lived at home with their mother, all of whom were present at the funeral. She also leaves five sisters and two brothers living on Prince Edward Island. The sisters are: Mrs. Edward Dignan, Mrs. David McAusland, Mrs. Edward Jelly, Mrs. James Smallman, Mrs. Harry Metherell and the brothers are George and Robert Horne.
