Canadian Trade Has Big Month

Exports Exceed Imports By \$16,731,512 Says Report.

OTTAWA, Dec. 13.—November proved another big month in Canadian external trade. Canadian products to the value of \$49,359,590 were exported, compared with \$48,944,520 for the corresponding month last year. The imports were also greater, totalling \$43,628,078 as compared with \$37,769,044 a year ago. The exports of Canadian products last month exceeded the imports by \$16,731,512.

Special Constables

CUSTOMS AND EXCISE DUTIES ARE GREATER

Increase of \$594,300 Over Corresponding Eight Months Is Recorded.

OTTAWA, Dec. 13.—Customs and Excise revenue in Canada for the month of November was considerably greater than for the corresponding month last year, figures were released today by the Department of National Revenue. The total receipts last month were \$30,356,485 which was \$2,459,061 more than in November, 1932.

November Figures

The following were the figures for November 1933 with the totals for the corresponding month the year before in brackets:

Customs duties, \$5,048,477 (\$5,296,027); Excise taxes \$11,075,622 (\$8,960,488); Excise duties \$3,168,402 (\$3,907,987); sundries \$80,932 (\$71,850).
The increases in revenue during recent months have wiped out the losses earlier in the financial year. For the eight months of the present fiscal year the revenue has been \$134,545,629 which was \$594,300 more than for the corresponding period last year.
In the income tax however, there has been a falling off. The total receipts for November were \$3,310,041 which was \$87,478 less than in November, 1932. For the eight months this year the receipts were \$31,788,345 a decrease of \$4,483,680 as compared with the corresponding period last year.
