MT. STEWART CHURCH SERVICE.—There will be a service in Mount Stewart Presbyterian Church tomorrow and on Thursday evening at 8 o'clock there will be a congregational meeting, presided over by the Rev. William Orr Mulligan, to make arrangements for winter supply.

BROOKFIELD CONGREGATION PICNIC.—The annual congregation picnic of the Brookfield congregation will be held in Darlington on Monday September 3. Let the whole congregation plan to be present and bring their friends with them. Sports and a good time for all.

ATTENDING EXHIBITION.—Among the Island exhibitors who left Thursday to attend the St. John Exhibition were Geo. Boswell of French Fort with sheep and hogs; Stewart Bros. of Dunstaffnage with sheep and hogs; Lane Bros., Pownall, with sheep; Roper Brothers, Charlottetown, Royalty, with 16 head of Guernsey cattle; Messrs. Cephas Munn and Oliver Saunders, Winsloe, left yesterday with some fine stock.

CITY SCHOOLS will open on Tuesday next. Parents are reminded that before new pupils are admitted to the school they must secure a permit from the Secretary of the School Board. New pupils must be vaccinated and present certificate to Secretary.

THE MARKET.—The market was very largely attended yesterday and there was a large supply in all lines. Fowl sold from 75c to \$1, chickens 60c to 90c; there was a large supply of eggs selling from 28c to 30c; butter 30c to 35c; in small fruit the supply and demand was good. Blueberries sold at 10c and 15c; raspberries according to the size of the dish; black currants 35c; gooseberries 25c; yellow transparent apples of good size and flavor sold at 10c doz. There was a good supply of vegetables especially cabbage, some heads weighing six and seven pounds selling at 10c and 12c per head. Carrots sold at 6c and 7c and beets 6c and 8c per bunch; cucumbers 10c each or three for 25c; potatoes ranged around \$1 per bushel; hay 35c to 45c per cwt. Hides owing to the recent decline in price abroad dropped to 5c with a good supply. It is pleasing to notice that the Charlottetown ladies are turning out in force, patronizing the market more extensively for their table necessities. Every line is fresh and clean and buyers save the middle mans profit, a big inducement.

CAUSED EXCITEMENT.—A bull which escaped while being shipped abroad yesterday created some excitement in the east end of the city. The animal was recaptured after some difficulty.

INTERESTED VISITORS.—Mr. and Mrs. P. L. Rand and Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Burgess of the Annapolis Valley, N. S., who have been visiting in Hamilton, the guests of Mr. and Mrs. F. J. Lockerby, spent yesterday in the city. Mr. Rand and Mr. Burgess are among the largest apple growers of the Annapolis Valley and prospects this season are exceptionally promising. Mr. Rand is especially interested in the fur business and has visited a number of fox farms besides that of Mr. Lockerby. He purposes adding a fox ranch in the near future to his extensive apple orchard.

FIRE OUTBREAK ON S. S. MAGDALENE.—Thursday morning when the ferry steamer Magdalen was about two miles off Pictou Harbor fire was discovered around the funnel. The boat was carrying a large passenger list and had there been high wind like the day before it would have been a serious fire. The prompt action of the crew no doubt saved the ship, as they lost no time in getting the fire hose to work, and are to be congratulated. This is the first time an accident has happened to this boat. The Magdalen left at four o'clock for Charlottetown, and has continued on the route as usual.

AERIAL PROSPECTS.—Major Shearer has made a reconnaissance of the Magdalen Islands with a view to reporting on the feasibility of an aerial mail service from and to the mainland in connection with the proposed service to Prince Edward Island. The feat of the United States cross-continent flyers in carrying letters between New York and San Francisco in a little more than a day indicates the possibilities of air mails. The Magdalens, as well as the Island, may look forward to the time when the air post will be a regular feature of their life, when other means of communication are not available.—Halifax Chronicle.
