NEW HAVEN, Conn., Dec. 4 — In the last 45 years the Henry Draper medal by the National Academy of sciences has been awarded to twenty men. The first woman to win this award for scientific achievement is Miss Annie Jump Cannon astronomer at Harvard University.

Miss Cannon attributes her love for astronomy to her mother, who taught her to observe the night skies from the attic window. Her girlhood observations were done with the aid of a smoking candle to light her astronomical guide book of stars. She went to the Harvard observatory as a young woman and has accomplished one of the most monumental astronomical tasks of all times.

She has catalogued more than 300,000,000 stars. The meaning of this may be understood by recalling that all the seeming myriads of visible stars number only about 5,000. Her catalogue is based on the spectra of the stars, which is a photographic analysis of the light of each of the vast host in her catalogue. This analysis shows whether the stars are composed mainly of one substance, such as hydrogen or of something else.

In the Henry Draper catalogue, where her work is printed she recorded 225,300 stars. This covered every star in the heavens brighter than the eighth magnitude. The publication required nine volumes. Since completion of this catalogue seven years ago, she has gone ahead with the still fainter stars, extending down almost to the 12th magnitude. In these seven years Miss Cannon has added another 100,000 star "spectra". Her catalogue is used by astronomers all over the world.
