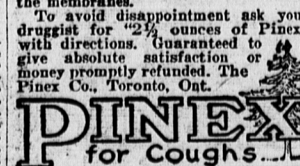

Brown, the President of the Club making the formal presentation the recipient making a suitable acknowledgement. Other pleasant features of the evening were vocal numbers by Mrs. (Dr.) Henneberry and piano selections by Miss Dot McIntyre of Providence. THE SYDNEY COAL-FIELD.

Submarine mining is the outstanding feature of the Sydney coal-field, Nova Scotia, and workings have been carried seaward to distances varying from one to two and a half miles. While the seaward extent of the seams is unknown, there are no indications of flattening or rising tendencies, and it is probable that the limits of mining will be determined by economic factors rather than by exhaustion.

THREE WEALTHY ST. LOUIS WOMEN FINED \$56,363 BY U. S. CUSTOMS.

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—Mrs. Lily Busch, 85-year-old widow of Adolphus Busch, wealthy St. Louis man, and her two daughters, Mrs. Charles Greenough of New York and Mrs. Nellie B. Loeb of Chicago, were fined \$56,363 today by United States Customs authorities for attempting to smuggle into this country a diamond bracelet and a considerable quantity of clothing. They paid the fine.

Mrs. Busch, who was ill, and was carried ashore in an invalid's chair, and her daughters were compelled in a "settlement in lieu of prosecution for smuggling" to pay the foreign value of the articles, with the duty added, plus 100 per cent, as penalty.
