He declared without any hesitation that no other part of the continent could show a more promising potato patch than a 200 acre patch he had seen in Augustine Cove, most of it the property of Mr. McFadyen. He predicts a great and growing future for Prince Edward Island seed potatoes, especially the certified Irish Cobblers which he says are the favorite in the potato growing states. The party yesterday visited the Experimental Farm and drove over some of the roads in the vicinity of Charlottetown, after an auto drive from Augustine Cove. Rt. Hon. L. C. Amery Coming to Canada

LONDON, Aug. 16.—The Right Hon. L. C. Amery, financial and parliamentary secretary to the Admiralty will visit Canada next month if the political situation admits of his absence from London.

He goes to the Dominion on a mission connected with the Empire Settlement Act and may possibly be accompanied by his wife whose home town is Whitby, Ontario.

Mr. Amery who is regarded as one of the greatest authorities on emigration in England, had charge of the Empire Settlement Act in the House of Commons and was largely responsible for the framing of the bill. On more than one occasion he has expressed himself as being keenly desirous that Canada should participate in the movement for immigration within the Empire and should receive its proper share of the fifteen million dollars which is set aside under the act.

He has had many conferences with Hon. P. C. Larkin, Canada's High Commissioner in London on this subject and although he is one of the most hard-working of the coalition ministers he is arranging to go to Canada in order that he may have a personal talk with Premier King and the Federal Cabinet to explain the provisions of the act.

Dublin Shocked by Death of Griffith

DUBLIN, Aug. 16.—Dublin was shocked early yesterday to learn of the sudden death of Arthur Griffith, President of the Dail Eireann, and everywhere it was commented on as one of the most tragic and wholly unexpected events in troubled Ireland.

Death came at a nursing home, apparently from a heart attack following an operation a few days ago for tonsillitis. Few people in Dublin even knew that the ardent worker for the Free State cause had been ill. Immediately signs of mourning were displayed; flags were set at half-mast on buildings and ships in the harbor.

The first question on all sides was what effect the death of the leader would have on the solution of the problems before the Provincial Government. His colleague, Michael Collins, recently has devoted his attention almost entirely to the military operations against the irregulars, while the country looked to Mr. Griffith to manage the civil affairs until the rebellion was suppressed.

Though President of the Dail Eireann, Mr. Griffith held no ministerial portfolio, William Cosgrave, acted as head of the Irish executive during Mr. Griffith's illness.

The President's associates were stunned by the news of his death. Not one of them was prepared to discuss its effects. They all agreed that Ireland had sustained a great loss.

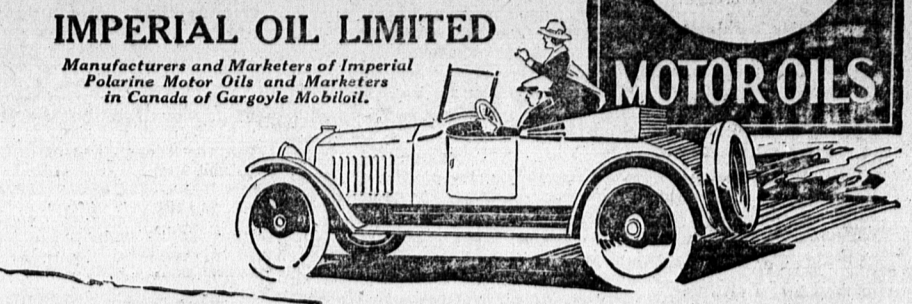
