MOSLEY ILL AND ORGANIZED CONSTITUENTS UNFAVORABLE IN RESPONSE

LONDON, March 19.—Sickness and unfavorable response from its organized constituents is playing havoc with the budding "New Party" of Sir Oswald Mosley, which in its very infancy appears to be facing a crisis. Influenza and pleurisy have robbed the young crusaders of their leader, Sir Oswald, just when he was needed most. W. J. Brown, probably Sir Oswald's ablest sympathizer, has gone to the Mediterranean for his health and others of the group are suffering from seasonal illness which is causing disruption of the national campaign. While five Mosleyites have resigned from the Labor Party, none has succeeded in obtaining a vote of confidence from their local labor organizations. Moreover, most of them have been called on to resign their Parliamentary seats but as yet none has done so. fighters who quickly gathered to aid Mr. Doucette. SOUTH LAKE

A large audience (chiefly farmers) attended the meeting of the cooperative members of the Prince Edward Island Potato Growers' Association, which was held in Elmira Hall on the evening of March eleventh last. The chairman, Mr. J. J. Campbell, opened the meeting with the usual formalities. The speakers: Mr. S. G. Peppin, Inspector in chief of the P. E. I. Potato Growers' Association, and Mr. J. W. Boulter, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, and Secretary of the P. E. I. Potato Growers' Association, delivered interesting and instructive addresses embracing the various phases of the "potato industry" in P. E. Island. Mr. Peppin, the first to take the floor, discoursed eloquently on topic, the chief of which are the following: The selection, the treating (with Bichloride of Mercury) and the planting of seed; the care of growing plant and the diseases to which it and the tuber is subject. Spraying the plants (with Bordeaux Mixture); and harvesting of the tubers; also the necessity of sowing clean seed oats. Mr. Boulter's address treated on: The planting of seed; (He prefers the planting of no 1's) Loyalty to the "association"; Marketing of the tubers; Financing, etc. Mr. Boulter advocates the use of the unmixing chemicals rather than the ready mixed fertilizers, as he says: "the former is cheaper, and gives a higher yield per acre." He advises the members to "lower the cost of production and increase the yield," thereby making "potato growing" a more lucrative industry. Interrogatories and comments were submitted by the fall: Rev. R. J. MacDonald, Mr. C. C. Dingwell, Mr. J. E. Dingwell, Mr. J. A. Fraser, Mr. G. B. MacEachern and Mr. P. E. Holland. The two officials answered these queries readily to the apparent satisfaction of all present, and with an ease of delivery characteristic of public speakers. The chairman closed the meeting with a vote of thanks to Mr. Boulter and Mr. Peppin. The farmers of this part have been busy for the last week or so, grading potatoes and hauling them to the stations. Mrs. Hugh MacLeod, Ugg, was a recent visitor to South Lake.
