S. S. Lady Nelson Due Wednesday

HALIFAX, N. S., Oct. 7.—When the hospital ship Lady Nelson slips into her berth here on Wednesday, it will mark the first time since former Canadian National Steamships flagship went into service as Canada's first hospital ship that she has carried sick and wounded Canadian servicemen back home.

The Lady Nelson went into this service early in 1943 just after the outbreak of the war. Her passengers will be 267 wives and 100 children dependents of Canadian soldiers in the Dominion.

The Letitia, under the new name of the Empire Brent, following the renaming of all British hospital ships, will arrive at the dock here on Wednesday. The former Cunard White Star ship is bringing 432 women and 274 children dependents to the Dominion.

To make up the three special trains which will be operated out of Halifax over Canadian National railway lines, the Dominion is sending three sleeping cars to be operated on regular trains to carry 69 to homes at various points in the Maritimes.

Justice Bill Would Abolish Death Penalty

By JAMES MCCOOK Canadian Press Staff Writer LONDON, Oct. 7.—(CP)—Abolition of the death penalty for a trial period, elimination of birch-treatment of prisoners are probable provisions of a Criminal Justice Bill expected to be introduced in the House of Commons at the next session of parliament.

Far-reaching changes are proposed in the treatment of young offenders and Mr. Ede probably will give consideration to a detailed report prepared by a Conservative party committee on this subject.

This report recommends that the existing power of courts to order boys under 14 to be whipped should be abolished and that imprisonment as a punishment for persons under 21 be replaced by new forms of institutional treatment.

Mr. Ede has examined reforms put forward before the war by a Conservative predecessor, Sir Samuel Hoare, now Lord Templewood. These were not put into effect because of war conditions and probably will be incorporated in the new legislation.

Mr. Ede is understood to have favored total abolition of the death penalty but was ready to admit this might lead to an alarming increase in crimes of violence and agreed to a trial period. If violence does not increase the new legislation can be made permanent.

Grading System The new act would provide a system under which every prisoner would be graded according to intellectual abilities and desirable remedies applied as recommended by experts. New emphasis would be laid on social work among prisoners, with study of their antecedents and social environment.

When a prison term was completed a man would not be left to his own devices with only the casual help of voluntary societies. He would be assisted in finding a place for himself and made to feel the state was his friend.

Lord Templewood's recommendations were discussed by parliament, although they never became law, and approval of many proposals was indicated. They provided for the creation of observation centres for young people on remand and hostels for cases where prolonged training appeared unnecessary.

Have New Variety Oats Resistant to Stem, Crown Rust As a result of fourteen years' intensive work by the plant breeders and plant pathologists at the Dominion East Research Laboratory in Winnipeg, a new variety of oats, resistant to all the races of stem rust and crown rust that appear in Canada, as well as being resistant to loose and covered smut has been developed. It is hoped that by the spring of 1947 about 1,500 bushels of the new variety, as yet unnamed, may be available for distribution to selected growers so as to increase production of seed to the point where there will be enough for all who want it.

EDINBURGH FESTIVAL ATTRACTS THOUSANDS With 10,000 visitors daily expected to attend Edinburgh's International Festival of Music and Drama this month, civic authorities are making plans for chartering a ship to provide extra accommodation. The liner under consideration is the 18,000-tonner now under-going refit for passenger traffic. She would be used as a floating hotel in the Firth of Forth. This will be Edinburgh's first sponsorship of an international event of this magnitude. There will be open-air and indoor theatre, ballet and folk-dancing, and a solo concert appearance by famous artists.
