Touring British Cricket Eleven Defeat West Indian Colonials In First Match

BRIDGETOWN, Barbados, Jan. 10.—The touring Marybone Cricket Club team emerged victorious at the end of its first test match in the British West Indies today, defeating a selected team of Colonials by four wickets. The West Indies eleven declared their second innings at the tea interval, 15 minutes after the opening of the day's play after six men had compiled the small score of 51. M.C.C. was able to run up the 73 needed for a win before stumps were drawn.

Pitch Rain Sudden
Hampered once again by a rain-soaked pitch which had made batters easy conquests for crafty bowlers, both teams had difficulty in plugging up a score. On the first day, West Indies succumbed with a meagre total of 102 for their entire first innings. M.C.C. declared their first innings yesterday at 81. With an overnight score of 33 for three, the Colonials lost three wickets cheaply today in the 15 minutes before the tea interval and declared their second innings with a score of 51.

M.C.C. came to bat with only two hours and ten minutes of play left in the third day of the match. But that two odd hours packed the

punch of more thrilling cricket than enthusiastic West Indian cricket fans had seen in many days. The visitors needed a bare 73 for victory, but on that slippery, soggy field 73 loomed a huge figure.

Lose Wickets Quickly

Four wickets were lost quickly for the small score of 29; two more fell and only 48 had been piled up. Then W. J. Lister and W. Hammond in a partnership that lasted until the end of the match. It was a dour struggle that ensued as the two gradually gained the necessary runs and concluded the match in a blaze of excitement with Hammond striking out a brilliant six mid-off boundary. Hammond went out of the first test match as the man who won the frame for England. His sparkling second innings performance in which he scored one six and three boundaries was only eclipsed by his first innings score—the second highest of the entire match. With a 44, West Indian George Headley, "the Black Bradman," had the best score, which he compiled the first day.

Displaying great courage and pace, Martinide was applauded time and again for his fine bowling performance for the Colonials.

Albany Defeats Freetown

The second game of the Clark League series was played in Bedeque Rink between the South Freetown and Albany teams Monday night. There was considerable delay in getting started caused by a dispute as to whether the players were eligible to play or not; however, it was finally agreed to play the game under protest, subject to the findings of the Executive and the result to be announced Monday 14th, Jan. Fred Moyse very capably acted as referee.

TORONTO, Jan. 10.—Gordon McLean, of Moncton, N. B., today interviewed W. A. Hewitt, secretary-registrar of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, but failed to get far with a plea for reconsideration of his case. McLean was refused a transfer from Winnipeg to Moncton.

The registrar advised McLean, a read investigation employ, to forward his documents and statements to E. A. Gilroy, President of the Association, and said only Gilroy could handle the case. McLean said his case was a legitimate business transfer; that he was moved to Vancouver by the Canadian National Railway for May and June last year; that he returned to Winnipeg and later was moved to Moncton. He had documents from the railway to support his statements.

Lacking Support Cagers Team Out

MONTREAL, Jan. 10.—Western cagers have no cause to worry this season about having to meet the powerful Nationale quintette which opposed Vancouver Province last week in a close and hard-fought netball final, because the team has completely disbanded.

Although Vancouver won the championship by three games to one after a close and hard-fought series, Nationale's feat in reaching the final marked the first time since the Montreal 1929 Coach Eddie Gronau intended to enter his team in senior ranks again this season but his hopes were wrecked by lack of a necessary sponsor and the team was forced to disband.

The Nationale team is well split up. Lynn Patrick is playing professional hockey with New York Rangers and his brother Murray has taken up residence in New York where he may be found among the amateur hockey ranks. Cliff Melrose has retired from actual participation after a long and starry career to take up refereeing. John Schuler and Mel Rice have lined up with the newly-formed McGill Grads quintette. Pat Griffin has signed with the Central Y. M. C. A. senior team. Bill Godsal is turning his efforts to coaching.

The Montreal Basketball League will have only four senior teams this year—Notre Dame de Grace Community Association, Central Y.M.C.A., Young Men's Hebrew Association and McGill Grads. Central Y., after an absence of four years from the senior ranks has returned with a fairly strong team supported by two stars from Western Canada, George Kelle, formerly of the University of British Columbia, and Mike Mitchell, who played several seasons with the famed Winnipeg Tilters.

Notre Dame de Grace will have two of the Big Four Football Union plunkin chasers to bolster their senior team. Len Hutton, outside wing for the Montreal Football Club, has already played several seasons with this outfit. He will be supported this year by Lew Newton, Wheeler Kooen, who is considered a competent forward.

As to rule changes, Montreal is strictly following the American code of rules with two exceptions—limiting teams to 10 players and allowing unlimited substitution. Montreal cage bodies have frowned on drastic rule changes suggested by far West cagers, especially since the basketball is on the coming Olympic programme.

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EAGLES LOSE TO BOSTON BRUINS 2-1

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 10.—Boston's Bruins moved into first place in the American division of the National Hockey League tonight by nursing two first-period goals into a 2-1 victory over the struggling St. Louis Eagles.

Missing a chance to move out of last place in the International section, the Eagles gave Boston a fast, hard fight but failed to convert any Boston defence openings into scores until the last 30 seconds of the game.

The game was the first played since the Eagles reduced admission prices and the attendance was several thousand larger than it had been at previous home games.

NEW YORK, Jan. 10.—The rapid-rising David (Sweeney) Schirner, sensational scorer from Calgary, held his own tonight with the bombing twins of the Toronto Maple Leafs, Charlie Cochrane and Harvey Jackson, and the New York Americans gained a 5-5 overtime tie with the National Hockey League group leaders.

The freshman from the foothills had hand in foot: New York goals, bagging two himself, and his sharp-shooting kept the Americans near enough so that Rabbit McVeigh's last-minute goal in the third period clinched the deadlock. There was no scoring in overtime.

The veteran McVeigh, the dashing Bill Hollett of the Leafs and managing director Conny Smythe of the Toronto club were the spotlight in a wild finish to the third period. Hollett broke away and jangled the puck past goalie Roy Worters for what looked to be the winning goal but was not allowed.

The officials ruled that Smythe called back for offside. Smythe jumped over the boards and protested vehemently to the referee. He was so incensed and so determined that the start of the overtime period was delayed because the Leafs boss refused to leave the ice. Finally he did.

Cochrane and Jackson, the league's leading point-getters, combined their margin over all but the brilliant Schirner. Cochrane scored two goals and assisted in another. Jackson netted one goal and helped with two. Joe Primeau and Pop Kelly got the other Toronto goals.

Maritime Clubs To Turn Professional?
