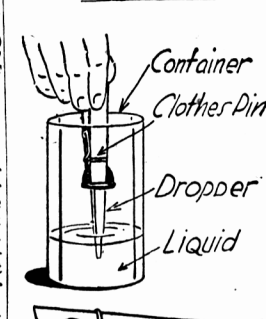

**Security Prices Are Higher On Montreal Market**

MONTREAL, Jan. 28 — (CP) —

Security prices generally were moderately higher on the stock exchange and curb market today, encouraged by the upward trend of New York market. Papers and industrials were the most active groups and displayed modest gains while other sections were mainly quiet and unchanged from yesterday's close. Turnover was light. International paced gainers in papers with a one point rise in fairly active trading. St. Lawrence Corporation was temporarily up 1-4, but closed at its previous quotations. Abitibi Preferred came in for good play in late dealings and was up 3-8. Others improved were Fraser, St. Lawrence Paper Preferred, Great Lakes Common, St. Lawrence Corporation "A", Bathurst "A" and M. and O. Off fractions were consolidated, Eddy "A" and Donnacona while Great Lakes Preferred dipped a point. Trading was distributed on a fairly broad industrial list, although no individual issue was heavily traded. Better were General Steel Works, Montreal and Canadian Locomotives, Canadian Industrial, Massey Preferred, Dominion Bridge, Asbestos, Gypsum and Ford. Chemicals and Sugar were softer and Dosco "B" converted an early loss into a slight gain. Brazilian upped 1-4. Bell and Montreal Power were steady and Shawinigan and Ottawa Power shinning in a dull utilities section. Montreal was off 1-8 in banks and C.P.R. same in carriers. Segrams was active in liquors and off 3-8 as was Canadian Breweries. Alco "A" ended unchanged after an early lift and Walker advanced 1-2 in light trade. Dominion Textiles dropped 1-2 in textiles and Ogilvie was firmer in milling. Base metals were mostly firm with Smelters up 1-4 and Nickel ahead a fraction after an opening loss. Metals were off 3-4. B. A. and McColt were slightly better in oils. Interest waned in mines and volume was light. Sherritt pushed up with a gain of 10 cents and Sullivan was ahead 8 cents while others higher were Heva, Formaque and Louvicourt. On the down-side were MacDonald, Central O'diac and Beaulieu. Mining box score: Total sales, 149,700; industrials, 39,700; mines, 110,000; stocks higher, 75; lower, 46; unchanged, 76; new highs, 2; new lows, 0.

**Sheep Breeding Was Graham Bell's Hobby**

Scientific breeding is the practical application of the science of genetics. It is of great importance to all concerned with animal husbandry. Perhaps one of the first great scientific brains ever to be applied to both the theoretical and the practical aspects of this science was that of Alexander Graham Bell, the hundredth anniversary of whose birth will be celebrated on March 3, 1947.

Bell's brain was such that he sought always new researches and enterprises. In his working life, the invention of the telephone was hardly more than an incident, for once the telephone was placed on a practical and economic footing, and as soon as the patent lawsuits connected with it were settled, we find Bell turning to other pursuits, most of which led to valuable contributions to science and society.

Bell's interest in genetics was aroused after he had purchased a house near Beddeck, N. S., which he called Bell's Breach. It was in the centre of a sheep-raising district. Bell noticed that the birth of twin lambs was a rare thing, which struck him as odd. Why did sheep not produce a litter, like pigs, or dogs? It was expensive to feed a large number of ewes through the winter, each one of which would produce just one lamb in the spring. From those single lambs must come the wool and the meat that were to be sold, and the animals for future breeding purposes.

Bell thought the answer lay in the number of nipples that sheep normally possessed, which was two, as compared to the many nipples which sheep did normally have six nipples, and which bore twins or triplets in more than 50 per cent of all births.

Work Carefully Tested All details of mating, feeding and lambing were carefully recorded and tabulated, and Bell carefully tested every possible feature to find out its effect on breeding. He lent his best six-nippled rams to neighbouring farmers, who agreed to
