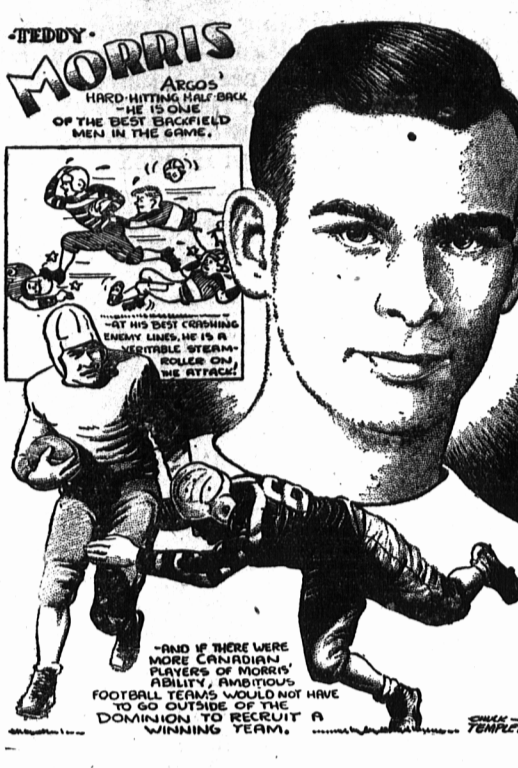
The old maestro of the majors is a trifle upset over the non-appearance of two of his henchmen in the persons of "Ching" Johnson, husky defense star, and Earl Seibert. The pair have delayed the arrival pending settlement of salary differences.

For some time it has been common knowledge Seibert was a hold-out. Last night Lester received word that the "Ching" also had an attack of contractitis. The recruits from rear-guard was still in New York today and until contract troubles are ironed out he is not likely to attend camp workouts.

Absence of Seibert and Johnson leaves Patrick with only two seasoned defencemen — Alex Levinsky and Ott Heller. In workouts here Bill Cook teamed up inside the blue line with "Babe" Pratt, promising Kenora amateur and a pupil at Lester's training school. Levinsky worked out beside Heller as alternates.

Newcomers to the Rangers were on opposing lines as canny Lester Patrick put his men through a workout on the ice. The recruits from Vancouver Lions, in the Northwest circuit, Bryan Hextall, Charlie Mason and Clint Smith made up one and Bert Connolly, of Moncton, Lynn Patrick from Montreal Royals, and the veteran Art Somers, formed the other.

General-Manager Art Ross and Manager Frank Patrick stated today they wanted their men to work on new formations and didn't want "anybody to disturb" the players.

Mechanical precision is the aim of Patrick who has the squad reeling off all kinds of passes. He is coaching the National Hockey League aspirants and veterans new and different ways of puzzling a goaltender.

"Tiny" Thompson as a result is being overworked, blocking rubber from all angles, but takes it with his usual grin.

Patrick has been using the following combinations of forwards: Nels Stewart, centre; Johnny Gagnon, right wing; "Red" Beattie, left wing.

Eddie Shore, Boston's great defenceman, is expected from his Western Canadian farm tomorrow. Patrick has the following rearward men working out: Archie Wilcox, Joe Jerwa, Jean Puse, J. Bretto and Bert McInenly. McInenly was out with the Cubs this afternoon and Bretto is expected to join him tomorrow, leaving Shore, Wilcox, Puse and Jerwa and the Bruin regulars.

### Ultimatum Handed Hamas As Garden Seek Likely Contender For Heavy Crown

#### CARLETON WIN PULL FROM MURRAY RIVER

Associated Press Sports Writer (By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—It was ultimatum day at Madison Square Garden, and before another week is out, Steve Hamas will either be in or out of the heavyweight challenging picture, and the winter program will be completely organized.

The Garden today gave ancient Charlie Harvey, manager of the former Penn State football star, until Friday of next week either to re-enlist his warrior for the indoor elimination wars, or take him definitely to the sidelines, to watch while another contender is developed for a heavyweight title fight with Max Baer here in June.

The programme firmly set down by the Garden is as follows: Hamas must fight Art Lasky, the Jewish heavyweight, over the 15-round route in the Garden in December, losing out of consideration the controversial 10-round decision Steve gained a few weeks ago.

The winner must fight Max Schmeling in January or February, probably outdoors in another of the Garden's extravaganzas in Florida, also 15 rounds.

About the same time, Primo Carnera will be back from a South American tour and can have his comeback chance against Ray Lupatelli, another Goliath, in the Garden, and if the showing of the winner suffices, he will meet the winner of the other half of the draw in a final elimination match.

"There's \$50,000 worth of activity there," said Col. John R. Kilpatrick, Garden President, as he laid down the law today to the Hamas forces who insist that Steve, on the basis of decisions over both Schmeling and Lasky, has qualified for the Baer chance.

If Steve stands on his present rights as a challenger, Schmeling and Lasky will be the first event on the programme, Carnera and Lupatelli the second, and the winners will meet for the right to challenge the champion.

science, and crowded industrial centres. In the ten-year period ending 1932, 836 farms became vacant in Prince Edward Island, 7988 in Nova Scotia and 2,690 in New Brunswick. Only two million 9,646,000 acres of occupied farm lands in the Maritime Provinces were in the hands of the farmer.

The government in the Maritimes was to strike a balance between manufacturing and agriculture.

The back-to-the-land movement, however, already was making progress, and now, in the period ending three years, 151,800 acres of crown lands had been apportioned to 6,000 new settlers by the Province of New Brunswick colonization department. Yet the failure to put unemployed men and their families on uncultivated farms in the Maritimes.

"Rather than invest hundreds of thousands of dollars in land purchase," continued the speaker, "land board could be set up with powers of expropriation, to take over uncultivated farms on a rental-option-purchase plan, paying the owner a suitable return on the investment, and the would-be settler, after having proved his ability to make good, have the option of purchase on an amortized payment plan."

### LEAFS HAVE NO HOLDOUTS

### May Reopen Granite Quarry

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) HALLOWELL, Me., Oct. 24.—Covered by an estimated 4,000,000 gallons of water, granite from the 95-year-old Hallowell quarry may again find a market.

Arrangements were completed today to start pumping out the water, accumulated over the years, to permit a thorough survey of the clear granite beneath.

The work was undertaken by a committee of the Chamber of Commerce and the Central Maine Power Company in the expectation a New York firm would take over the quarry for operations.

The quarry was opened in 1839 and for many years employed 800 persons in cutting out the granite used in some of the most famous buildings and monuments in the United States.

In later years the only activity at the quarry has been the production of paving blocks and finally this was abandoned as the trend grew toward concrete and asphalt paving.
