Continued from page 1 Shrines. There are in all eight shrines or chapels in the Cathedral, three in the basement and five in the main church. There is a shrine or chapel in each transept, one dedicated to St. Joseph and one to St. Anne. These shrines contain altars of various colored marbles. The one on the south side has a niche flanked with Connemara marble colors containing a fine statue of St. Joseph. The altar is made principally of Statiana and Sienna marbles with onyx columns. Over the shrine there is an arch which is a modification of the Percy Shrine of Beverley and contains some beautiful stucco marble, the whole supported by two triple columns of dark Numidian marble. The shrine on the south side is similar to that on the north. The altar here is principally of Sienna-Brache violet and onyx marbles and the niche contains a statue of St. Anne. On each side of the main Sanctuary are chapels finished in marbles, green Vermont, chocolate, Tennessee, black and gold, Nile-green and brache-violet predominating. One contains a very beautifully modelled and colored statue of Our Lady of Victories, the other a less beautiful statue of The Sacred Heart. These four chapels are

The main sanctuary is easily one of the finest in America. The main altar with reredos is 44 feet wide. It rises to a height of 37 1/2 feet above the sanctuary floor and is 78 feet from the foundation to the top of the cross. It weighs about forty tons and is of a brilliant and pleasing blending of marbles, green Vermont, gold and black, brache-violet, Statiana, Numidian, onyx, Nile-green, Connemara and many others producing a most striking effect. On either side of the altar and rising to the length of twenty feet are the canopies of marble and the stalls, including the Episcopal throne of beautiful carved oak. The various communications, the pulpit and the Stations of the Cross are in colored marbles and are unequalled by any cathedral in Canada.

The loors of the whole church and vestibule, including the sanctuary and the side chapels, are finished in Terrazo with pink Tennessee marble borders and panels, and the walls of the whole building have a dado of green Vermont marble. All the steps of the sanctuary, the chapel and of all the altars are in green marble. The pews of polished oak are capable of seating 1800 people. The choir gallery is large and has a seating capacity of about 300. The basement chapel has a seating capacity of 1200.

Following the disastrous fire of St. Dunstan's Cathedral on March 7, 1913, which completely destroyed the building, the present edifice was erected and was dedicated on Sept. 24, 1919, by His Excellency the Most Reverend Pietro di Maria, Archbishop of Iconium, Apostolic Delegate, on the occasion of his first visit to Prince Edward Island.
