THE REGISTERED COCKEREL, A FACTOR IN IMPROVING PRODUCTION AND EGG SIZE

(Experimental Farms Note)
The introduction of the Registered Cockerel into poultry breeding work overcomes a number of very serious hazards which heretofore have been unavoidable. Some of the outstanding of these uncertainties are, first, false advertising, second, small egg lines, third, immature or diseased specimens, fourth, standard disqualifications and fifth, pedigree.

In the first instance false adver-

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being is entirely eliminated. The Registered Cockerel is bred from birds with officially recorded production and every operation in connection with the recording of his ancestry carefully checked by a Registration Inspector. In the next instance Registered Cockerels are bred from large egg lines only. All small egg birds are disqualified and never bred under the Registration Policy. In the third instance immature or diseased specimens are rejected by the inspector. Any bird possessing a standard disqualification is also rejected by the inspector. The pedigree of a registered cockerel is authentic and reliable and accepted by the Federal Government.

As was expected, poultry registration was slow at first but rapid improvement has taken place during the last few years. The first registered cockerels appeared in 1926 and since that time the number has increased very rapidly. A large number of these desirable birds will be available for sale this fall.

It is a well recognized fact that chicks bred from hens are much superior to those bred from pullets. Every registered male is bred from a hen as pullets are never bred until they have completed their yearly record and have been registered.

To qualify for registration a female must lay 200 or more eggs which weigh 24 ounces per dozen or over during the year. Registered cockerels must have at least two direct lines of 200 egg females which have laid 24 ounce eggs or better in their pedigree, or in other words they must be sons and grandsons of registered birds or the sons of 200 egg birds with eggs weighing at least 24 ounces per dozen.

The dam of the Registered male must be a worthy specimen of the breed she represents so far as type and colour are concerned, she must be of good size and above all she must have constitutional vigour. The cockerel before being registered must be passed by a Registration Inspector, be at least six months of age, be free from disqualifications and possess good breed type.

Being bred from parents which inherit high production and large eggs registered cockerels possess the breeding necessary to not only increase the egg production in any flock but to insure egg size as well. Since these cockerels are bred from mature hens the buyer can rest assured he is getting birds possessing good constitution and plenty of vigour. A further guarantee of these desirable qualities lies in the fact that every registered cockerel is approved and marked by the Registration Inspector.

Parties wishing to improve production and egg size in their poultry flock should secure Registered males to head their breeding pens for the coming spring.

Poultry Registration work in Canada is conducted by the Poultry Division of the Experimental Farms Branch of the Federal Department of Agriculture, co-operating with the Canadian National Poultry Record Association.

dleton all of whom were in last year's contest have entered again. Mr. William Sansom's B.R. pen 11 led the contest for the week with 21 eggs, 20.6 points. Mr. James Tuplin's B.R. pen 15 was second with 19 eggs, 15.9 points and the Experimental Farm, Charlottetown B. R. pen 7 are third with 20 eggs, 15.6 points.

The production for the week was 142. Forty-one eggs were disqualified for being under 20 oz. to the dozen.

In this contest 82 birds are from registered hens.
