### INTERMARITIME

### RIFLE MATCH

On Thursday last, on the St. John rifle range, the 28th annual competition for the International cup, which during the past year has been held by Nova Scotia, took place. This match, which is undoubtedly looked upon as the blue ribbon event of rifle shooting in the Maritime Provinces was started in 1886 and the cup has been won 13 times by Nova Scotia, 8 times by New Brunswick, and 7 times by Prince Edward Island, the Island team having won it four times in the last six years. The score made this year was the third highest ever made in the competition and has only been beaten or equalled by two scores also made by a team from the Province. The highest score ever made is 762 made at Charlottetown by the Island team two years ago and at that time the record for every range was broken.

Possibly there never has been a year when there were so many first class shots in Prince Edward Island from which to select a team, but, unfortunately, a great many of them were, for one reason or another, unable to go and the result was only seven really first class shots were available. Lt. W. K. Rogers being selected as the eighth man. This weakness, however, was offset by the very strong shooting made by the other members of the team particularly Kennedy, McLean, McCabe and Landrigan and by the very skillful coaching of Athol Seaman, assisted by Sgt. J. A. Moore. While the day was very fine the shooting conditions were about as bad as this match has ever been shot under. A three to five minute fish tail wind blew during the whole day and after for fifteen to twenty minutes not a shot was fired by either team. Several misses were made by the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick teams and outsiders fell to the lot of all. A banquet at which Lt. Col. McLean presided was tendered the visiting riflemen by the New Brunswick rifle association and a most enjoyable evening was spent. The Island riflemen speak in the warmest terms of the kindness and courtesy extended to them by their competitors, of the great thoughtfulness of Major Frost of the New Brunswick Association, who looked after every detail of their comfort, of the kindness, courtesy and absolute impartiality of Major McGee, who so ably performed the duties of range officer. The match next year will be on Kensington range, Charlottetown, and will be shot on the second Thursday in June. Below are the scores made by each team.
