"FOUNDATION FRANKLIN"

The salvage tug, "Foundation Franklin" which assisted in removing the Sydfole from Indian Rocks followed the Sydfole into port here Monday night and left for Dalhousie about 12.30 yesterday afternoon. The arrival of this tug is of some interest as it will be remembered it was this steamer which was ordered from Halifax on March 9th to the rescue of the S. S. "Harburg," drifting helplessly in the Atlantic. It will be recalled how the "Foundation Franklin" during the heavy western gale had her steering gear carried away and she too was at the mercy of the wind and tide for fourteen hours, being out, in all, sixty-eight hours, until repairs were made under great difficulties when the tug again proceeded to the scene in the teeth of the gale. An American tug also started out when it was learned the "Foundation Franklin" was disabled and with the wind in her favor, was the first to reach the "Harburg," claiming the salvage money. However the owners of the F. F. claimed remuneration as they were ordered to the scene and the case is now pending in Court. Capt. Lewis, master of the "Foundation Franklin" is no stranger to this port as he made several calls here while master of the well known S. S. "Coban." He was in the service of the Dominion Coal Company for thirteen years, before taking command of the salvage tug. The "F. F." is a product of the John Lewis yards of Aberdeen. The steamer was originally H. M. S. "Frisky," the ship's bell with that inscription being still in use, and was connected with the salvage department of the British navy, so that the boat is well equipped for salvage work in those waters. The tug carries a crew of twenty five, is equipped with wireless, radio, and other first class appointments.

WINNIPEG 39 ST. JOHN 37

(By John Mosher, Canadian Press Staff Writer) SAINT JOHN, N. B., May 3—Although Saint John Trojans worked like Trojans tonight, Winnipeg Toller's fought mightily enough to finish victorious by the narrow margin of two points as the first game in the Dominion Basketball championship series ended with a score of 39 to 37. It is a best two out of three series with the second game scheduled for Thursday night and if a third match is necessary it will be played Saturday.

Both teams alternated as scoring leaders in one of the fastest and most hotly contested games ever seen here. Time and again one side shot into the lead, only to relinquish it in a matter of seconds.

With the last half nearly over, both squads tied 37-37 and the fans feverishly excited. Toller's took possession of the ball and Silverthorne shot the final winning field goal.

In the opening minutes of the game Toller's fooled Saint John with perfect combination work and easily ran up 10 points. But as the play proceeded there was little to choose between the two teams. Toller's gave a more finished exhibition but this was balanced by the fighting spirit displayed by their heavier opponents.

Silverthorne and Dodds were outstanding for Winnipeg with 10 points each, while Malcolin and Paterson led the scoring for Saint John with 12 points each.

TORONTO, May 3—(By The Canadian Press)—Lionel Conacher, football, lacrosse and hockey player of renown, who is considered one of the greatest athletes Canada has ever known, used gridiron tactics in his first professional wrestling match tonight and defeated Carl Pospeshil, Boston, in straight falls.

Conacher hit his opponent with two flying tackles to take the first fall in 11.19 and tackled three times in a row to win the second fall in 1.30.

McDougald Takes Parting Fling At "Political Foes"

OTTAWA, May 3—(By The Canadian Press)—Taking a parting fling at his "political enemies," Senator Willard Laurier McDougald, whose resignation is being transmitted to the Governor General, declares himself to be without desire "to have any further association with them." His letter to Senator Raoul Dandurand, read tonight before the Senate adjourned, thanked the Liberal members of the Senate committee for their vindication of his honor.

"These gentlemen, having heard the evidence given before the committee, and having reviewed the argument of counsel, have unanimously expressed the opinion that the condemnatory findings of the reports of the special committees of the Commons and of the Senate are not justified by the evidence," he wrote.

Political partisanship alone accounted for the condemnatory features of that report, Dr. McDougald wrote, predicting that the Senate's division tonight would be on party lines, with the Liberal Senators declining to accept the report.

"In the light of the partisan political character of both inquiries," the letter continued, "it would be impossible for anyone belonging to the political party which is in the minority in both Houses of Parliament, to expect more in the way of vindication than this. So far as

related to the recorded views and votes of members of the Senate, who are also members of my own political party, it is a complete vindication.

"To all who have joined in denouncing the partisan nature of the inquiry, and in making clear that what has been expressed by way of condemnation of myself in the report is not borne out by the evidence, I wish to express my profound gratitude as well as thanks.

"With three members of the Conservative party in the Senate who have not hesitated to do all in their power to destroy me, both politically and personally, I have no desire to have any further association. Having received the vindication I have from those whose regard I cherish, I feel that the time has come when I may honorably withdraw from the Senate, and I therefore give to you, herewith, as leader of the party in the Senate, my resignation, witnessed as required, and shall be obliged if, on my behalf, you will kindly see that it is tendered in due form.

"In severing my connection with the Senate, may I, as a parting word, express the hope that my withdrawal may help to appease the passion and recriminations which have already done untold injury to an enterprise of national importance, and help to restore peace and amity in this chamber."

(Cons., Saskatoon), that expense account vouchers for 1929 and 1930 be produced for a list of officers submitted, including W. D. Robb, R. B. Teakle, W. J. Barber, Walter S. Thompson, director of publicity, and G. H. Lash, publicity officer in New York.

Throughout the day Sir Henry Thornton, President of the system, was bombarded with questions from every angle, and at times the feeling ran high as between the committee members, and between the chairman and officers of the road.

The President's Residence

The topic that held the chief interest of the committee today was the residence at 1415 Pine Avenue West, Montreal, occupied by the President. Evidence given the committee indicated that this house, formerly owned by Fred Beardmore, was purchased by E. R. Decary, prominent Montreal lawyer and late director of the Canadian National, and leased to the railroad for \$15,000 per year. The transaction was carried out while Mr. Decary was still a director of the railroad and just before the general elections of 1930. Mr. Decary will be called to give evidence before the committee and is expected to appear tomorrow afternoon when the next session will be held.

Hon. Dr. R. J. Manion, Minister of Railways and Canals, told the committee that the House deal had gone through before he took office and that when Sir Henry had approached him with the reminder that the resolution of the board of directors in relation to the House lease had obliged the company to furnish it, he had refused to have anything to do with it. Sir Henry told the committee he had equipped the house himself at his own expense, and that it had been a liability to him rather than an asset.

OTTAWA, May 3. (By The Canadian Press)—Sir Henry Thornton, President of the Canadian National Railways, was called upon to defend the legal department of that company today before the house committee on railways and shipping. Several members of the committee criticised the department as being "too expensive" and "over-manned." It was shown that the total legal expenses of the road during 1931 were \$546,039.

Sir Henry promised to have the chief legal counsel of the road, Gerald Ruel, appear before the committee, and to give the committee a complete list of all counsel employed both as permanent members of the staff and as part time officers.

Figures given the committee by the economic department of the Canadian National, disclosed that while the members of the legal staff were paid \$373,853 in 1929, \$381,514 in 1930 and \$363,223 in 1931. Retaining fees during the same periods were: 1929, \$17,233; 1930, \$13,146 and 1931, \$12,467.

Fees paid outside lawyers in 1929 amounted to \$163,351, 1930, \$110,860

The railway head told of the Canadian National system being approached with a request to build a hotel in Jamaica, which it refused to do. The project was carried out with financial backing of the Jamaica Government.

The committee was told that the hotel was now about to be sold under foreclosure.

OTTAWA, May 3—By a majority of 27, the House of Commons tonight defeated on second reading a bill to amend the railway act. The vote stood 70 for 43 against. The measure was introduced by Thomas Reid (Lib. New Westminster), who claimed it would assist in remedying the differential in the rates on grain and flour westward.

All Conservatives, with the exception of W. J. Loucks (Cons. Rosemont) voted against the bill. A. A. Heaps (Lib. Winnipeg North) voted with the Government. Liberals and Independent members with Mr. Loucks voted for the measure.

THE FEDERAL PARLIAMENT

OTTAWA, Ont., May 3—(By The Canadian Press)—Chief Justice Anglin, as deputy to the Governor General, gave Royal assent in the Senate today to a number of bills which had passed both Houses. These bills include the following: to amend the patent act; to amend the petroleum and naphtha inspection act; respecting debts due to the Crown; to amend the opium and narcotic drug act, 1929; to amend the Yukon Quartz Mining act; respecting the Canadian Pacific Railway Company; to amend the destructive insect and pest act; to incorporate Lake of the Woods international bridge company. There was also a number of divorce bills.

OTTAWA, May 3—(By The Canadian Press)—The House of Commons this afternoon went into committee of the whole House to consider the resolution moved by the Minister of Finance in respect to the Canadian National Railways financing. The resolution reads, "That the governor-in-council may authorize the guarantee of securities of the Canadian National Railway company, made or issued from time to time under the Canadian National Railways Financing Act, 1932, to an aggregate principal amount at any one time outstanding of \$61,500,000."

Hon. E. N. Rhodes, asking unanimous consent of the House to take the resolution up immediately in committee, stated that the authority was required at once and that the resolution had the approval of the Governor General.

The resolution advanced quickly and a bill based on it was introduced. First, second and third readings were given to the measure and it goes to the Senate.
