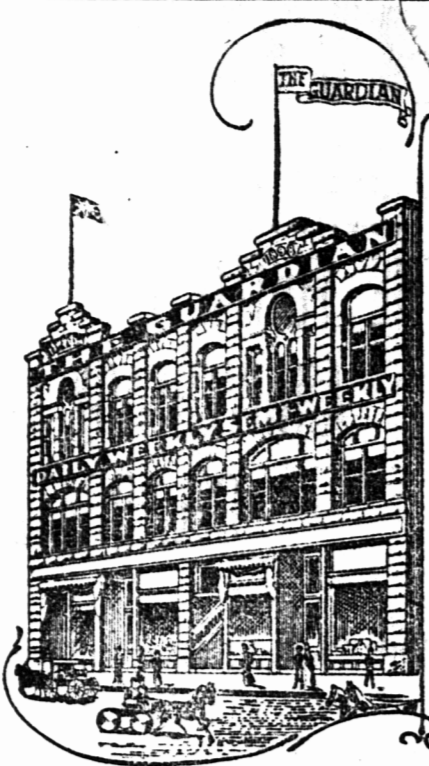

**THE PROVINCES AND THE FISHERY AWARD.**

The St. John Telegraph prints in full the text of Attorney General Pugsley's argument submitted to the Dominion Government in support of New Brunswick's claim to its share in the Fishery Award. The argument is an able and exhaustive one, and inasmuch as the claims of the Maritime Provinces rest upon the same legal and constitutional basis, the argument is quite as good for Prince Edward Island as for New Brunswick. It is of too great length to be reproduced in our columns, but we think an outline of the argument may be of interest to Island readers.

In the first place Dr. Pugsley sets forth an outline of the treaty of 1871 between Great Britain and the United States under which the subjects of each nation were given the right to catch fish in the inshore waters of the other along the Atlantic coast of North America. Article 22 of the Treaty provided that as Britain claimed that the fisheries in British American waters were of greater value than those of American waters a Commission should be appointed to determine the difference in value, and this difference should be paid. The Commissioners met at Halifax in 1877 and awarded the sum of \$5,500,000 to be paid by the United States to Great Britain. This amount was paid by the United States whereupon the British Government paid \$1,000,000 thereof to Newfoundland and the balance of \$4,500,000 to the Government of Canada. Here Dr. Pugsley points out that a much larger claim had been made out than the sum awarded, the British claim having been that in respect of Quebec, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island they were entitled to twelve million dollars, and that Newfoundland was entitled to two million eight hundred thousand dollars.

An elaborate statement follows with a voluminous citation of authorities to show that the waters and all that they contain and the land under the water to a distance of three miles from low water mark are vested in the nation owning the shore, and that in British America this possession is vested in the Sovereign. It follows that the coast waters of a Province for a distance of three miles from the shore are so much a part of the Province as are any other parts of its territorial possessions or the trees growing thereon. It was thus in the case of Newfoundland, which was rightly paid her proportion of \$1,000,000 out of the Fishery Award. Dr. Pugsley argues that the Provinces of Quebec, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and P. E. Island should have been treated in the same manner and that the balance of \$4,500,000 should have been equitably divided between them in 1877 instead of passing into the federal treasury.

In support of this contention he cites the decision of the Privy Council in the case between the Attorney General for Canada and the Attorney General for Ontario et al (Appeal case 1898, p. 700) in this case it was decided that whatever

proprietary rights were at the time of the passing the British North America Act vested in them, except such as were by any of its express enactments transferred to the Dominion; and it determines that whatever proprietary rights in the fisheries were in the Provinces before the passing of the B. N. A. Act still remain in them respectively. Their Lordships state clearly their opinion that "the 91st section of the B. N. A. Act did not convey to the Dominion of Canada any proprietary rights in relation to fisheries." In other words the Provinces never parted with their possessions in the coast fisheries, which were clearly theirs before the union of the Provinces.

The claim of the four eastern Provinces of Canada to the present ownership of the fisheries adjoining their coasts seems too strong to be successfully resisted, and the same may be said of their claim to the capital sum of the Fishery Award. Prince Edward Island's claim is still stronger than the claims of the other Provinces from the fact that this Province was not a part of the Dominion for nearly two years after her fisheries were barred away. How the money shall be apportioned among the claimant Provinces is a matter yet to be determined after their claim to the Award has been made good. And then there is the claim for interest since 1877 on the large sum awarded and paid to the Dominion. In regard to that, however, the Dominion will have a formidable contra account, having set aside \$150,000 a year for distribution among the fishermen in bounties, and having expended also a large sum annually in protecting the fisheries. But after making all due allowances the Eastern Provinces may reasonably hope to realise something handsome out of their fishery claims.
