THE KING IS BUSY.

LONDON, Oct. 7.—While the House of Commons is concluding the committee stage of the budget, the King, assisted by unofficial advisers, is actively intervening to prevent the crisis which the Government's financial proposals threaten to precipitate. The House has accomplished its consideration of the bill. The fight therefore, so far as Parliament is involved, is adjourned until Nov. 19, when the measure will come up for report. It is likely that the bill will be much modified before it leaves the Lower House, thus enabling the Lords, without loss of prestige to agree to the Bill, on the understanding that an election will be held in January.

Kind neighbors and friends were daily with her, assisting in every possible manner, but all efforts failed. The cause of the death was embolism in the brain. A very sad feature of the case is that her parents, D. J. and Mrs. Evans, left their home at Sherwood for California on the 15th of September, Mr. Evans going there for the benefit of his health. A message received from Mr. Evans stated that they left for home on the 6th. The funeral will not occur until they arrive.
