KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS ANNUAL CONVENTION

Dr. McMillan Receives Splendid Ovation.

Dr. J. W. McMillan returned on Saturday night from Chicago where he was present as State Deputy of the Maritime Provinces at the Supreme Convention of the Knights of Columbus. The doctor was accompanied by Mr. E. C. Harahan, Sydney, N. S., First State Deputy, and these two were the only delegates from the Maritime Provinces.

The Order showed an increase in membership for the past year of 25,000, and now numbers 387,000, of which over 20,000 are Canadians, and 2,000 the membership in the Maritime Provinces.

This year's was entirely a business and war convention dealing exclusively with matters of routine and arrangements for assisting in the war. About two months ago the Supreme Board of Directors voted a million dollars for chapel and recreation tents at the front for the American soldiers. As the result of the convention this vote was increased to \$3,000,000, the first million being assured. This does not include the Canadian vote, which is now being collected and which is expected to amount to about \$50,000. In the United States this work has been recognized by the Government and given the same status as the Y.M.C.A. work.

In this connection Dr. McMillan was called upon to give details of the work carried through by the Canadian organization, as it has been engaged in providing such tents almost since the war began. The information he supplied was invaluable, and assisted materially in the Convention coming to a decision with regard to the U.S.A. levy. The impression made upon the Convention by Dr. McMillan last year when he took part in a similar discussion, was very much increased and intensified on the present occasion due to the fact that the United States is now allied with Canada in this struggle for civilization. He received an ovation second only to that accorded to the great American orator Joe Scott.

Frequent reference was made to the magnificent part Canada has taken in the war and the expression was often heard "if we could only do as well as Canada has done." The Supreme Knight, Mr. L. A. Flaherty in his address stated that nowhere on this continent had he received a welcome equal to that tendered to him in the Maritime Provinces, especially Prince Edward Island.

All the Supreme Officers were re-elected, and the Convention concluded after a two days' strenuous session.

COSSACK GENERAL WOULD DEFER ELECTIONS

(Canadian Press Despatch.) PETROGRAD.—The general of the allied council of Cossack troops has addressed a memorandum to Premier Kerensky urging him to defer the election for the constitution of the assembly. The plea of the Cossack is made on the ground that the population weakened by long disorganization of power generally shows signs of inertia and because a third of the Cossack population is at the front and cannot participate in the elections.

KERENSKY MAY COLLAPSE

Strain Telling on Strong Man of Russia.

LONDON.—The health of Alexander F. Kerensky, Russia's man of the hour, is a matter of grave concern to his friend and associates, according to members of an English delegation which has just returned from Petrograd. Premier Kerensky's health was none too good when he took office, and the strain since has been not only constant, but probably heavier than that of any other statesman in the world today.

Illustrative of his weakness, it is stated that even during the first weeks of the revolution, every public speech he made was followed by a period of faintness. His friends say that only his tremendous will power and nervous energy have kept him going so long.

Those who have seen the brilliant leader in the past few weeks describe his face as being haggard and drawn and his figure emaciated. His voice is still strong and vibrant, but his speech is marred by frequent coughing, and his eyes are brilliant, but not with the brilliance of ruddy health. The Premier's whole appearance unmistakably shows the effect of the enormous work required of him every twenty-four hours and the heavy responsibility and constant drain on his slender physical resources.

"If Kerensky can only hold out" is the phrase more frequently heard among his friends and admirers, indicating their dread of his physical collapse and what that would mean to the destinies of Free Russia.
