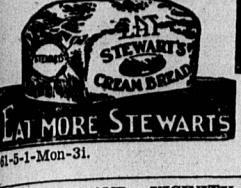

WHERE FISH ARE FISH—GLACE BAY, N. S., May 9.—About a hundred swordfish are landed daily at Glace Bay each season, states the Natural Resources Department of the Canadian National Railways. Over three hundred swordfishing boats operate off the Cape Breton coast annually. One of the tourist attractions of this part of Nova Scotia is a trip with the swordfishermen to the swordfishing grounds to witness the adventurous occupation. The flesh of the swordfish is tender, sweet and wholesome and may be prepared for the table by frying, baking or boiling.

COMMUNICATIONS REFLECT UPWARD TREND BUSINESS—MONTREAL, Que., May 9.—The quickness with which various communication agencies react to changes in the economic world is demonstrated in the recent installation of five new tickers and employment of additional telegraph operators in Montreal by the Canadian National Telegraphs following the renunciation of the gold standard by the United States and the improvement in Canada-United States exchange rates. The telegraph line between Montreal and New York has been especially affected and more telegraph messages have passed over the wires of the system recently than for any like period since last August, officials of the telegraph company stated.

ROSEBUD GOES WITH CHAMPION BLUENOSE—Captain Walters and Crew Take Their Favourite Tobacco to Fair

Walters has expressed the opinion that the slight alteration in the keel has added to her speed, if anything. He is confident of victory over the American challenger. Get Special Leave To Film Guards—LONDON, Eng., May 9.—The King gave special permission for the changing of the guard recently at Windsor Castle to be filmed for a British news reel film. The 1st Battalion of the Welsh Guards on duty.

The King, the Queen, and other members of the Royal Family watched at the castle windows while the film was being made. Princess Elizabeth and her baby sister, Princess Margaret Rose, and the Hon. Gerald Lascelles also watched from another window.

In the afternoon by command of the King, the bands of the Royal Horse Guards and Welsh Guards played on the east terrace, and the gardens were thrown open to the public. A crowd of 6,000—a record for this time of the year—listened to the music.

The Royal Family frequently appeared at the windows and acknowledged the crowd's greetings.

Later Princess Elizabeth, Princess Margaret Rose, and Lord Lascelles and the Hon. Gerald Lascelles walked in the private grounds in view of the thousands on the terrace.

SAINT JOHN, N. B., May 9.—"There's gold in that dump" and there is, consequently, somewhat of a flurry in the discovery of gold assaying a value of \$7,85 to \$9,08 per ton from three samples of weathered chalcopryite or copper ore taken from the dump of the old Oliver Mine at L'Etete, Charlotte County, N. B., according to the Natural Resources Department of the Canadian National Railways. The mine was abandoned some fifty-five years ago after being worked for copper which ran up to 20 and 30 per cent. The samples were taken from the refuse dump at random and efforts are now being made to locate the vein which it is supposed the gold came from. Officials of the Department of Lands and Mines of the Province of New Brunswick are interested and have already started on a detailed map of the region but according to Dr. Wright, provincial geologist, the geological survey has not yet been completed.

OLD DUMP YIELDS GOLD

PUSSY IS RESCUED BY A CHESAPEAKE DOG—SASKATOON, Sask., May 9—"Prince" is a good dog. He is a large brown Chesapeake and hearing a disturbance on vacant land near his home, leaped over the fence and sized up the situation. Three dogs, led by a big police dog, attacked a cat; when "Prince" arrived pussy was lying senseless on the ground. He just walked in picked up the cat by the neck and carried it to its own doorstep and there licked its wounds. "Prince" is owned by Mr. and Mrs. J. Phillips.

CANADA'S YOUTH MAKE FUTURE LOOK BRIGHT—TORONTO, May 8.—With evident optimism and spirit of advance young people of Canada make the future look bright, Mrs. Lillian B. Thomas, Winnipeg author of the play "Jim Barber's Spite Fence," presented at last week's Dominion drama festival, said in an interview here today.

"In art the spirit of the young people is optimistic and gives high promise for the future," Mrs. Thomas declared.

Speaking of the drama festival, she quoted Governor General Earl Bessborough as saying: "I did not start it. It grew on me." The festival is a whole, she described, as beautiful and a great success.

Mrs. Thomas is in Toronto in connection with presentation of plays by the Masquers Club, Winnipeg, winner of the Bessborough Trophy for amateur dramatic supremacy in Canada.

SUMMERSIDE TOWN COUNCIL

The regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held on Monday evening, Mayor Manson presiding over a full council board.

The estimates for the year were brought down at this meeting. Estimated revenue was \$74,004.65; expenditures \$72,235; surplus \$1,769.65.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted. Town bills were passed as follows: Paid bills, \$2,616.74; unpaid bills, \$287.42; electric light paid bills, \$605.35; unpaid bills \$200.70.

The reports of the committees were received and passed.

Coun. Phillips, Police Committee, reported four drunks convicted; police assisted Mounted Police in three raids on local speakeasies; fines \$54.00.

Coun. Phillips also submitted the milk test.

Coun. McNeill, Street Committee, reported that the work of repairing the western approach to the town was going along well, but it was found necessary to purchase more wood as the butment was badly undermined. The streets had all been dragged. There were a large number of men applying for work and it was difficult to arrange the work to give each man a chance.

A motion was passed for the usual grant of \$75 for the Public Library; and also \$25 for the Red Cross to assist in the inoculation of the children in the schools.

A by law was passed to set the assessment rate, which will be the same as last year. A by law setting the poll tax at the same figure as last year was also passed.

Dr. E. T. Tanton, health officer, addressed the Council on the unsanitary condition of the slaughter house; after explaining to the Council the present state of the building and drainage he condemned the place as unfit to be used to kill animals, which were to be used for human consumption. Dr. Farrell, meat inspector, endorsed Dr. Tanton's opinion and advised that the place be torn down and a new building erected with a cooling system and also a cooling room added, which is very necessary for the proper handling and preparing of meat which is to be used for human consumption. He suggested that the place should be municipally owned and a man placed in charge to keep every thing in a sanitary condition.

Meeting adjourned until Friday, 12th, for the purpose of meeting the citizens to discuss the question of building new streets. S. Milk Test
