Dr. J. A. Brace Says Japs wish To climb down

"With 3,000 Germans stationed in Japan to advise the Japanese, and urge them into the fight against the Allies, the Japs are really becoming the tail of the German kite," Dr. A. J. Brace, head of the Y.M.C.A. world service, Toronto said in an interview yesterday afternoon. A traveler, soldier and lecturer, he was Y secretary in Chengtu, China, for 25 years and is thoroughly conversant with conditions in the Far East.

Instructor of modern history for 10 years in China, Dr. Brace views Vladivostok as an important city in the events of the Far East. This Russian port, situated in the southern part of the country, is located at a point where Manchuria, Korea and the U.S.S.R. meet. It is also only about three flying hours to Tokyo, Capital City of Japan. The Japanese have about 250,000 troops concentrated on the Manchuria border ready to go into Vladivostok at a moment's notice should the Germans weaken the position of the Russians, Dr. Brace said. On the other hand, the Russians have strongly fortified the port and have prepared for any eventuality.

Another bone of contention in the Far East is the island of Sakhalin, half of which belongs to Russia and the remainder to Japan. However as the port owned by Russia contains oil, the Japs are watching it with covetous eyes. But the Russians are watching it carefully, Dr. Brace was of the opinion that Japan would be kept quite busy trying to defend a 4,000-mile line stretching from Siberia to the Dutch East Indies and he thinks they are "scared stiff." He also expressed the belief that they are indulging in a "bluffkrieg and would like to climb down."

When Dr. Brace went to China

the Japanese are angered by the fact that the Chinese have put up such an excellent resistance and further annoyed that Great Britain and the United States recognizing the value of the Chinese aid to democracy have both aided China recently. Great Britain by reopening the Burma Road and lending China ten million pounds sterling and the United States through Roosevelt's recognition of the valid claims of China by recognizing her in his lend-lease bill whereby the United States loaned China \$50,000,000 to help stabilize her currency and fifty million more to get out tungsten over the Burma Road, which is greatly needed in the steel industry in America for building ships to aid Britain in winning the battle of the Atlantic. The Chinese
