ries shall not be interrupted. Other important pronouncements were that the government proposed to proceed with the naval base at Singapore and that invitations had been accepted to the Prince of Wales to visit Argentina next year when he was also visiting South Africa. Closest co-operation with Dominions and India would be the guiding principle of the government, which would also adhere to a policy of encouraging Empire settlement and mutual trade, submitting to parliament recommendation for further imperial preferences based on proceedings of last year's Imperial Economic Conference. (Special to the Guardian)

OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 9. - If effect is given to the Imperial Economic Conference resolutions dealt with by his Majesty in the speech from the Throne at Westminster Abbey the country will chiefly benefit. Her exports of canned salmon and canned lobsters, raw apples, honey, dried fruit, sugar, tobacco and to a certain extent perhaps on native wine. Under the resolution Empire dried fruit is to enter the foreign market free, while foreign dried fruit will be dutiable at 10 s 6 p per hundred weight, this applies to such foreign dried fruits as apples, pears and peaches, as the Dominions may consider of interest to their trade on sugars. The British Government guaranteed that if the duty were reduced the preference for a period of ten years would not fall with it on tobacco. The preference is to be increased from one sixth to one quarter on wines of a strength between 30 degrees and 40 degrees; Preference is to be doubled on sparkling wines; preference is to be increased from 30 per cent to 50 per cent on raw apples from the Dominions to be
