Sweden's Champ. Hurdler Arrives In United States

NEW YORK, June 23.—Sten Pettersson, Sweden's champion hurdler and sprinter, arrived in New York recently on the liner Stockholm, forming the vanguard of a number of European stars who will arrive for American honors in the National A. A. U. track and field championships in Philadelphia on July 2, 5 and 6.

A number of A. A. U. officials and a large Swedish delegation greeted the runner as he stepped off the boat, among the gathering being Carl Christerson, former Swedish hurdle champion who has been in this country a number of years and now represents the Newark Athletic Club.

Pettersson paid an official visit to A. A. U. headquarters in the afternoon and presented his credentials from the Swedish amateur athletic authorities. His permit calls for his return to Sweden not later than Aug. 31.

Pettersson said that he would compete in both the 120 and 440 yard hurdle races at the A. A. U. championships and also in the special hurdle races at the meet which the A. A. U. will stage at the Yankee Stadium on July 7 for the benefit of the Cathedral of St.
