MARKET GOSSIP

Sentiment in New York is cheerful while many believe that technical reactions will be more frequent during the current month, they insist that there has been no development as yet to indicate that any sharp break is in the making. Nevertheless, they are cautious and advise clients to go slowly in making new long commitments at this time. The majority of students favour the buying side on reactions, but advise against climbing for stocks during the rallies. Stop orders are being recommended for those with narrow margins as a safeguard against any unexpected break.

Foreign Power Securities

Foreign Power Securities Corporation made considerable progress in 1929. The net earnings for the past year show an increase of over 100% over the 18-month period to October 31st, 1928. The common stock of the company is listed on the Montreal Curb Market and is currently selling around 25, and as earnings for 1929 were equivalent to \$3.30 a share, it is evident that the stock is selling at only 8 times its earnings, about the lowest ratio of any public utility security listed.

Montreal Power

Rumours still persist of impending favourable developments for Montreal Power. A split-up is freely talked of, some believing that it will take place in the very near future, whilst others are of the opinion that it will be delayed until after the local civic elections in April.
