Miss Guisler with the infant was on her way to attend a funeral and as she drove along a big tree which had been burning through near the roots, fell over the buggy, killing both of the occupants instantly.

NEW BRUNSWICK GREAT DROUGHT

Forest Fires Raging, Little Rain Since June, Wells and Brooks Gone Dry.

ST. STEPHEN, Sept. 18.—(Special)—This section in common with the rest of New Brunswick is suffering for rain of which less than five inches have fallen since the first of June.

Tonight the atmosphere is dense with smoke from fires that have wrought much damage.

Out at Meadows a fierce fire has been sweeping the timber land for some days.

Back of Oak Bay much damage has been done and there is fear of it getting into the village.

This afternoon a new fire started at Dugan's Heath, six miles from town and has assumed dangerous proportions.

The farmers' wells and brooks are dry and there is nothing to fight fire with.

BIG LIBERAL DEMONSTRATION

HELD IN SUMMERSIDE LAST NIGHT.

BERLIN, Sept. 17.—Prof. Bier, the distinguished surgeon of Berlin, is using cocaine for operations on arms and legs, by bandaging the limb above the wound and then filling the veins with a cocaine solution, which prevents all pain, while the patient still conscious. Before the operation is removed all traces of cocaine was washed from the veins.

CHICAGO, Ill., Sept. 17.—Court, jury, two attorneys and a half dozen witnesses spent three hours yesterday afternoon in Judge Eberhardt's court on a controversy involving twenty-two cents. Finally the court was adjourned the Judge reserving his instructions to the jury.

The case is one in which William Hindley, an attorney, is suing a department store for twenty-two cents, the amount he alleges he was charged for a substitute "Just as good" as the article he ordered, when he was sent by his wife to the store to purchase a deodorizer. He says the clerks refused to refund the money, but the store dealer denies this.

Attorney Hamilton Moser, representing the department store, offered twenty-five cents for principal and interest to Hindley at the commencement of the trial and the offer was refused.
