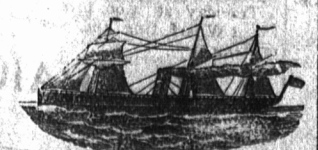
### CITY OF CHARLOTTETOWN:

### FOREIGN OFFICERS IN THE WAR.

The war representatives of the various European nations who are with either the Japanese or the Russian army have, of course, not yet been heard from. It would go hard with any of them who should by indiscretion permit the information that is assumed to be gathered solely for the military instruction of his nation to get into the hands of the war correspondents. This group of French and Spanish officers shows General Silvestre, Major Cheminon and Captain Bouce of the French army, who are now in Asia, and Colonel de Mendosa and Captain La Serra of the Spanish army, who left shortly after the war broke out and are now with the Japanese advance into Manchuria. General Silvestre is the best known of these men, and as captain made a brilliant record in the French-German dispute in '70. Colonel de Mendosa is a grandee of the real stripe, Castilian and was military instructor to the present King of Spain during the last three years of the latter's minority.

## GARDEN MODEL OF SIR H. M. STANLEY.

The countryside is radiant with furze bloomy all about the little village of Pirbright, and near here, on a slope of pleasant country, is Furze Hill, the country seat of the late Sir H. M. Stanley.

The great explorer chose well his retreat during the last year of his active and adventurous life. The house is a fine mansion of brick, stone faced, of a fashion something Elizabethan, and about it are spacious green lands. By contrast with the aching sunlight and the blighting heat of Africa, it is paradise in a ring-fence. But the man who discovered Victoria Nyanza and spouted the Congo to its source, could not forget the wilds that gave him fame.

So, in the garden-reaches below the house he had the ground laid out to keep Africa in mind. Mr. Muirhead, the steward of the estate, carried out the work, following the map to which Sir Henry added such substantial areas, and now a miniature Congo drowns in a bed of cement through English underwoods and a winding path between Hawthorn and dog-rose leads one to a summer-house on the topmost crest of the Mountain of the Moon.

What this dwarf Congo lacks in breadth it makes up in depth. In the middle of its widest part, where the mighty river is a dozen yards from shore to shore—it is 12 feet deep. There has been no slavish adherence to geographical detail in the design; that was impossible from the first, through the nature of the ground and the size of the original. And the Congo of Pirbright runs around half an acre of island, which the spring has turned into a thicket of young green.

At one place, the Congo turns into the Zambesi, and its waters thunder over a five-foot concrete fall in imitation of the Victoria Falls.

When Sir Henry was in residence, there were canoes and a punt on this water, and the youngest members of the family took their turn at solving the riddle of the Congo and cutting their way to the roof of the world on the Mountains of the Moon.

Higher up in the grounds in Victoria Nyanza, a line sheet of water, from whence issues, as is due and proper, the River Nile. A bridge spans the lake, and there are boats on it, and in this model the Congo itself draws its water from Victoria Nyanza. The whole scheme cost a very large sum, and was an idea in which Stanley himself took the greatest interest.

He spent many an afternoon, alone or in company with his wife, in the summer-house on the Mountains of the Moon. From there the whole of the elaborate and costly toy can be seen, and it is curious and not a little pathetic to think that the man who bored a road through the bleak hostility and imminent dangers of an unknown country should derive pleasure by means of channels and islands in an English garden, Congo, Nile, and Zambesi! There were names that had the force of technicalities for him—they were a part of his trade—and when he had used them, he made them in miniature to keep by him, as an old sea captain keeps a glass-encased model of his ship.

It was essentially his alone. If you ask a villager of the matter you get a blank stare. "Congo? I don't know nothing about no Congo," is your answer. "It cost a heap of money," is the first comment of the men on the estate, and it is only those who had a hand in making it who know which is Congo and which is Nile. It has taught no geography and aroused no local interest. It was Stanley's toy, his memento of days when he carried lives in his hands and pushed the borders of civilization further and further apart.
