NEW PAY, MASTEEER—The McAdoo schedule of wages which means a substantial increase of pay to all P. E. I. and rallyway employees goes into effect on the P. E. Island Railroad today.

Mr. McDonald is a man of 33 years and the accident, it is feared, will go hard with him. At last reports he was suffering much pain.

TUG ISLANDER SOLD—The tug boat Islander owned by the P. E. I. Tug Company of Charlottetown has been sold to Henry's Limited, of Halifax where she will be engaged in the towing service. She leaves Charlottetown on Thursday for Halifax.

MEETING TONIGHT—A joint meeting of the sessions of Zion and St. James congregations will be held in Zion Church parlor tonight at 8 o'clock to complete arrangements for the entertainment of the Synod.

POTATO MARKET—The potato market opens today at 60 cents a bushel at the principal shipping centres. There appears to be an abundance of the early varieties and the indications are that large quantities will be shipped before the regular fall congestion begins.

SOCIAL SERVICE COUNCIL—A meeting of the Social Service Council was held in St. John on Friday at which Prince Edward Island was represented by Rev. Dr. Fullerton. It was decided to appoint a Field Secretary for New Brunswick and P. E. Island, the expenses of which service would be borne jointly by the two provinces. The budget was fixed at \$5,000 of which Prince Edward Island's share would be \$1,000. Dr. Fullerton spoke strongly on the need of an industrial home to be maintained by the Federal Government. The Industrial Home in St. John as at present conducted, he characterized as a sham as it failed to train the boys for a useful life as the aim of such an institution should be. He advocated the establishment of an industrial home in P. E. Island and also the placing of a training ship either in Halifax or St. John where the older boys could be sent for training.
