Rally Fails To Wipe Out Early Losses

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire)

MONTREAL, Jan. 11—The stock market recovered its footing late today but was unable to erase most early declines.

Rail's slipped into a narrow decline and fractional losses showed in National Steel Car and C. P. R. Oils were mixed.

Papers were under pressure much of the time and St. Lawrence Paper Preferred dropped a point to 47. While Price Brothers Common and St. Lawrence Corp. issues sold narrowly lower, Price Preferred gained four points to 49 on the first transaction this year.

Construction did better, though a few fell by the wayside. Up fractions to a point were United Steel Dominion Tar, Canada Cement and Foundation. Dominion Bridge and Dominion Steel B gave ground.

Total sales: 130,300 shares; Industrials 48,100; mines 82,200. Bonds \$2,450.

Livestock

MONTREAL, Jan. 10—(CP)—A steady trend prevailed on all sections of Montreal livestock markets today with receipts comparatively light on cattle, calf and lamb divisions. Hog market strengthened after yesterday's price slide.

Receipts: Cattle 33; calves, 305; sheep and lambs 78; hogs 3.

Good steers made \$5.75 while good heifers brought \$5 to \$5.50 with mediums mostly \$4.75. Good western cows made \$4.75 and common butchers \$2.75 to \$3.25. Canners and cutlers went from \$2 to \$2.50 while common bulls made \$3 to \$4.

Bulk of veal calves were fair to mediums and sold in mixed lots at \$9 to \$9.25. A few medium goods made \$10 with common lights at \$7. Grassers went from \$4 to \$4.50.

Good ewes and wethers sold on a graded basis at \$7.50 on lamb section while the balance of offerings were mainly bucks and made \$6.50 to \$7. Sheep sold from \$2 to \$4.

Bacon hogs, fed and watered, brought \$9 while selecters drew the usual \$1 premium with the regular cut on off grades. Sows sold from \$6 to \$6.75.

Grain Prices

WINNIPEG, Jan. 11—(CP)—Bears, heretofore stepped on in the young 1938 Winnipeg grain market, went into action today with a selling spurge large enough to knock wheat prices more than three cents higher.

Key to their action came from Chicago and Buenos Aires which registered losses of around two cents. Selling also was more effective because of dearth in export demand. Final wheat in 3 1-4-2 cents lower, May at 1.27 3-4, July 1.19 1-4 and October 1.00 5-8-3-4. Stop-loss orders were encountered.

Top grades of Red Springs cash wheat closed unchanged, No. 1 and 2 northern at 24 and 14 cents premium over May future. Demand for durums was slow but spreads at times were slightly higher.

Apart from export buying in barley coarse grains had a dull day. Oats closed 1 1-4-1 1-8 lower, barley 5-8-1 1-8 lower, flax 1-4-7-8 higher, and rye 1 5-8 cent lower.

MONTREAL, Jan. 11—(CP)—Pound Sterling lost nearly 1-4 cent on Montreal foreign exchanges today at \$5.00 1-16 while the United States dollar firmed 1-64 cent to 1-64 premium. The French franc was unchanged at 3.39 cents.

NEW YORK, Jan. 11—(AP)—The French franc, under heavy selling pressure again today, declined .00 5-8 of a cent to 3.38 5-8 in terms of the United States dollar.

The French control fund's heavy sales of Sterling were responsible for a 1-4 cent decline in the pound to \$5.00 1-16. Guilders were off .02 of a cent and the Swiss franc .01 of a cent. The Canadian dollar was off 1-64 of a cent at 99 63-64.

Sportsman Held In Girl's Death

SAULT STE. MARIE, Ont., Jan. 10—A coroner's jury decided tonight that Helen Grier died last Oct. 29 "from a bullet fired by a person unknown, with strong suspicion of Vernon Spencer". The Wixom, Mich., sportsman was arrested immediately on a charge of murder.

The 28-year-old Portiac, Mich., stenographer was found shot to death in an isolated hunting lodge 38 miles north of here. With Spencer, she had occupied the cottage during a hunting trip, one of several the couple had made to this district in the past five years.

Spencer, a former professional baseball player who once played with Toronto Maple Leafs of the International League, had been held in custody as a material witness since the day he made his way through Northern Ontario bush to notify authorities of the tragedy.

Co-operation Needed To End Slump, Claim

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire)

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10—Business can pull itself out of its slump if it is given co-operation by the United States Government, industrial leaders told the Senate Unemployment Committee today.

Both Laurent Du Pont, President of the E. I. Du Pont De Nemours and Company, and Dr. Claudius T. Murchison, president of the Cotton Textile Institute, denied at a committee hearing that business had gone "on strike" against the administration.

The president of the Delaware Chemical Company urged that Government and business "take counsel together in a spirit of forbearance and cooperation." The "fog" of uncertainty should be dispelled, he said.

Murchison called for repeal of the undistributed surplus tax and said Government regulation should be directed "only to those purposes which are general fundamental, clearly necessary and appropriate."

Stocks Close Fractionally Higher In N.Y.

NEW YORK, Jan. 11—Stocks worked up a mild last-minute rally in today's market after a shift in session during which most leaders were at lower levels.

Early declines running to a point or more were replaced with advances of fractions in most instances but there were a few downward turns when the final gong sounded.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was up 3 of a point at 47.9. Transfers aggregated 1,506,250 shares compared with 1,827,500 yesterday.

Gains outdid declines on a sluggish Canadian list. Walkers advanced 1 1-4 points to 43 and Dominion a point to 53 as Distillers-Scagrams, International Nickel, McIntyre and Lake Shore gained fractionally. Ford and Brazilian were easy.

The armaments theme continued to sustain aircraft. Douglas ran up 2 1-4 points in the last hour to 45. Up fractionally were Curtiss-Wright "A" at 18 1-4, Glenn Martin 21, Boeing 34 5-8 and Sperry 19 1-2.

Another small lift in copper and lead prices brought support for stocks in these groups.

WILL TRY WINE FOR BABY FOOD

CAPE TOWN, Jan. 11—(CP)—Three pairs of South African identical twins have been offered to Dr. C. Louis Leipoldt for his milk versus wine diet experiment.

"One pair of boys, 10 1-2 years old, appear to be most suitable," Dr. Leipoldt said. "Unfortunately, they will not be available until February. If there are no further offers the experiment will have to be postponed until then.

"The whole investigation will be strictly controlled on scientific principles. If the results are encouraging more extensive tests will be made with the co-operation of large classes of children."

A letter to the Argus condemns the experiment:

"What happens to the 10-year-old who at the end of a year will have acquired a taste for wine which the very experiment may have proved to be detrimental to his health and development. This result would not merely confirm the present scientific view that the alcohol contained in wine belongs to the type of foods that act as fuel for the immediate needs of the body. They cannot be used to form new materials."
