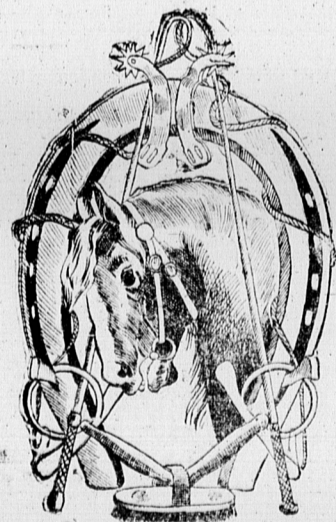

## BOYS PAINT A COW GREEN AND SHE DIES

NEW YORK, Nov 2—Eight-year-old Charlie Coyne, of the Bronx, put it all over Rosa Bonheur as an animal painter yesterday. He also put it all over Thomas N. Cuthbert's Jersey cow, and the cow died, and that was why the boy was in the Children's Court yesterday charged with malicious mischief.

Cuthbert is a lawyer at No 45 Broadway. He lives at Riverdale avenue and Two Hundred and Sixty-first street (yes, that's in the city), and keeps a cow for fun and fresh milk. Coyne lives two farms away, also in town, and does most any thing for fun and leads other farm boys to it. He led them to a pot of green paint in a vacant lot yesterday and Cuthbert's cow, being curious, nuzzled up and was just naturally seized as a living easel. To keep her quiet while they worked, the boys let the cow drink a little of the paint, which looked something like grass.

The boys painted portraits of their teacher on both sides of the cow, and decorated her with suns in addition and such simple sentences as "This is a cow." Coyne and his friends then ran away, and in a few minutes the cow lay down and died.

Coyne was arrested as the leader of the enterprise, and in court Mr Cuthbert urged that he be committed to an institution. Justice Zeller let him go with a warning that if the cow had lived her milk would have been poisoned by the paint and might have killed the persons using it.

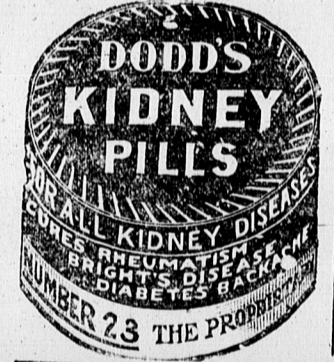

## STEAMER HALIFAX MUST UNDERGO REPAIRS.

HALIFAX, Nov 2—On Saturday the steamer Halifax was placed in the slip to undergo an inspection of her hull by the new hull inspector, Captain Seely. As was anticipated repairs were necessary. The hull inspector ordered the whole hull to be stripped of its metal covering and extensive repairs made. The old nail holes must be plugged, the hull must be cleaned, the bottom must be caulked, thirty knees must be refastened, the hull must be re-metalled and other repairs must be made. The ferry commission must furnish the metal, nails, felt and oakum needed for the work. It is estimated that it will cost about \$1,000 to make the repairs to the bottom of the Halifax.

## EXIT PICTURE POST CARD CRAZE.

LONDON, Nov 2—The Post Office report shows that the picture post-card craze is rapidly declining. Fewer telegrams are sent owing to the increased use of the telephone. Over \$3,000,000 was found in letters that were not delivered because they were wrongly addressed.
