 for Pictou, returning at night.

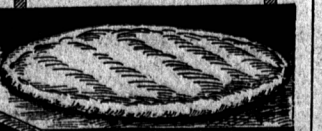
At the recent St. John exhibition

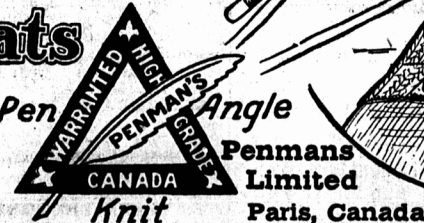
