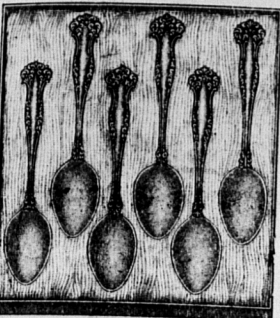

There died very suddenly yesterday  
 morning at Mill Cove, Fredrick F.  
 Hughes, youngest son of the late  
 Philip Hughes at the early age of 15  
 years. He leaves to mourn a widowed  
 mother, one sister and six brothers.

 try in 1868. The message asked to

 July last. Mr. Hood is the only son  
 of the late Samuel Hood, formerly of  
 Crapaud. The latter was a brother of  
 R. H. Hood, Cornwall, and J. M.  
 Hood, Tryon.

A sensation developed in Scott Act  
 circles in Fredericton, N. B., recently  
 when one of the men said to be en-  
 gaged as a spotter was called as a  
 witness for the defence in a third of-  
 fence case against Thomas Peeney of  
 the Lorne Hotel. When the court  
 opened Harry Perry, of Charlotte-  
 town (P. E. I.) was the first witness  
 called for the defence. He had been  
 engaged to act as a spotter with  
 Robert N. Belyea, Frederick McQue-  
 sition and a man named Hansen. Perr  
 on the witness stand said that after  
 the last court day he had told Be-  
 yea, who is the leader, that he was  
 not going to stand for convicting  
 people on false evidence, and that  
 Belyea told him that would be all  
 right and he would fix it with him-  
 later. He said Belyea had sworn to  
 buying a bottle of whiskey labelled  
 Mountain Dew from James Jamieson  
 at the Lorne Hotel, whereas he had  
 bought it elsewhere.—St. John Tele-

A cablegram has been received from  
 England to Mrs. Hogg, requesting  
 that the body of the late Sidney  
 James Allison be interred tempo-  
 rarily, awaiting further instructions. Ac-  
 cordingly final preparations were  
 completed, and yesterday morning the  
 remains were removed to St. Peter's  
 cemetery and interred in the family  
 plot of Mr. Hogg, Rev. Canon Simp-  
 son saying the final words of com-  
 mitment to the grave. It can be  
 readily understood that the first  
 cable was sent without due knowledge  
 of the conditions of travel from this  
 Province in winter, and that it is  
 probably the real facts were learned  
 in the meantime and the first cable

 particulars were given. Frank was  
 about 25 years of age, and for the  
 past two years was employed with a  
 barber in Amherst. While in Char-  
 lottetown he was employed with  
 Reardon Bros. The following dis-  
 patch was received yesterday morn-  
 ing from Amherst, Frank Carroll,  
 the young man who was injured by  
 falling off the intercolonial express  
 No. 9 early Tuesday morning, died at  
 six o'clock this morning. His death was  
 due no doubt to loss of blood and  
 exposure. The unfortunate man was  
 not found until some twenty or thirty  
 minutes after the train had left.  
 The operation of amputating his leg  
 was very successful, and the other  
 injuries were not considered serious  
 enough to cause death. The remains  
 will be taken to Charlottetown for  
 burial, where his father and mother  
 reside.

There were no cases tried before

 on the previous day the case of  
 Thomas Strickland, for keeping a  
 fierce, malicious and dangerous dog  
 was further adjourned for one week.
