

Favorites Fall By Wayside At Montague Racing Meet Yesterday

Favorites took another licking at the Montague harness racing meeting held yesterday afternoon with an estimated crowd of 2600 fans seeing four out of five favorites fall by the wayside in the great racing program staged. Two of the five classes staged went to extra heats before the winner was decided, with Tennessee Sue being the only winner to chalk up a straight heat victory while Kelly's Nightmare, winning the No. 2 classified event, was the only favorite to come through in the day's program.

Tennessee Sue in winning the feature event chalked up the first upset win as she led the field of four in all three heats with a smooth pacing performance and being given well rated drives by driver Dave Wisener. Lee's Nightmare was second in all three heats, with Vella La Vella and Gay Law finishing in that order.

Kelly's Nightmare made sure of her victory in the No. 2 event by capturing the first two heats but was forced to bow to The Baron in the third and final mile in the sensational drives that were being uncoiled in the stretch.

Billy McVeigh, improving with every race after losing the opening heat of the Classified Trot and Pace to Single Streak, showed all his pacing ability to take the next two miles in stirring duels with Lucky Spencer, but it remained for the final two events on the card to produce the most stirring action of the day.

In the first division of No. 4 Classified, Shirley Temple, after being fourth in the first two heats won by Bud Kalmuck and C. Albert Budlong, the Hooper-owned and driven mare came back to win the third mile and force an extra heat; then she paced away from the other two heat winners to account for the second victory of the day for the Hooper stable.

Babe Britton made an even more spectacular comeback in the second division of the class. Sixth in the first heat and dropping back to seventh in the second, she looked well out of the running but with Ola Budlong and Just Betty splitting the first two, the Babe made an extra heat necessary by stepping off with the third. The rest is history. Babe led Just Betty and Ola Budlong to the wire in the raceoff to account for the fourth upset win of the day.

Indians Back On Top In American

Behind the four-hit pitching of Bob Lemon, Cleveland Indians batted their way to the top of the American League yesterday, thumping Boston 9-0.

A crowd of 30,748, sweltering in 90-degree heat at Fenway Park, saw the Red Sox drop 1-2 game back of the Indians in the red-hot drive for first place.

New York Yankees moved closer to the top—1½ games off the pace—by doubling Chicago 8-2.

In the only other afternoon hit, Detroit Tigers handed the fast-pitching Philadelphia A's their fifth straight setback, 10-4.

St. Louis played the Senators under the lights in Washington.

For Lemon, it was his 17th victory and his eighth shutout.

A four-run second inning, in which nine of the Tribe batted and drove starter Denny Galehouse to an early bath, sent the Indians off on their way path.

Every one of the Indians hit at least once except Ken Keltner and Bob Kennedy.

Shortstop manager Lou Boudreau hammered his 11th homer of the campaign in the sixth and Larry Doby hit his eighth in the eighth inning.

Boudreau, Joe Gordon, Doby and Jim Hegan each got three hits and three of the nine Indian runs were sent across the plate by Doby, speedy negro center-fielder.

Fighters Sign For Bouts

NEW YORK, Aug. 25 — (AP) — The tournament of champions, four headline fighters got together today at a midtown restaurant and signed contracts for their Sept. 21 doubleheader boxing show at Jersey City, N. J.

The signing ceremony was held up for a short time until Marcel Cerdan, the French middleweight champion who meets world titleholder Tony Zale in a 15-rounder, drove in from Idlewild Airport. Cerdan had just flown in from Paris.

Jersey Joe Walcott and Gus Lesnevich, the two heavies who will tangle in a 15-rounder on the same card, were also there.

Musial Has Big Margin

NEW YORK, Aug. 25 — (AP) — The sluggers are moving in on Stan Musial and may prevent the St. Louis outfielder from making an unprecedented sweep of National League batting titles.

A late surge by big Johnny Mize has moved the New York Giant first baseman into first place in driving in runs with 96. Mize batted in eight runs during the week ending Sunday to top Musial in that department by one run.

Mize also pulled ahead of the Cardinal flycatcher in homers although the New Yorker trails Pittsburgh's Ralph Kiner by one. Kiner has 32 four-baggers, Mize 31 and Musial 30.

But in the other hitting departments the story is still Musial. He picked up three points during the week to maintain his lead with a .384 average, 49 points higher than Alvin Dark, runner-up from Boston. Dark is hitting .335.

Musial continues to set the pace in runs with 105; hits with 176; doubles with 34, and triples with 13.

Richie Ashburn, the fleet Philadelphia rookie, fronts the base stealers with 28 and is fourth in batting with .322. Chicago's Andy Pafko remains third with .303 followed by Ashburn, Tommy Holmes, Boston, .318; Country Slaughter, St. Louis .316; Red Waiatus, Chicago .315; Sid Coon, New York .302; Will Marzshall, New York, .298 and Mize .297.

St. Louis' Harry Brecheen monopolizes the pitching departments. He has the best win-loss record with 15-4 for .729, and tops the strikeout artists with 107 whiff victims.

Travels Long Distance For Tuna Tournament

WEDGEPORT, N. S., Aug. 25 — (CP) — An Argentine team will travel 6,000 miles to compete in the international Tuna Tournament to be held here Sept. 8-11, it was announced today. It will be the first time the country has been represented in the tournament.

Other squads will represent Cuba, the United States and the British Commonwealth.

Members of the Argentine team will be: Pablo Bardin, Captain; Jaime Llavallol, co-captain; Camilo Aguilar; Jose E. P. Ayersa; E. Charles Badaracco and Edlef E. Hosmann.

Soldier's Rip, the tuna grounds where the teams will fish, is yielding good catches. So far this season three times as many tuna have been landed than at the same time last season.

Merchant Ships Badly Damaged

LONDON, Aug. 25 — (Reuters) — Merchant ships of Britain, Italy and Spain were badly damaged off the British coast today.

The new 8,726-ton Cunard steamship Asia, outward bound from Southampton to Montreal, was holed amidships below the water line and escorted back to port after a collision with the 7,200-ton Italian vessel Ciclope off St. Catherine's Point, Isle of Wight. The Asia carried 800 automobiles for export.

The Ciclope, bound for Anwerp from the Black Sea port of Odessa, continued to her destination under her own power. She was reported to have had her bows badly damaged above the water line.

A lifeboat was standing by the 8,718-ton Spanish ship Monte Nuria, aground off the east coast near Cromer, her bows ripped open.

She shipped water and ran aground in broad daylight after striking a wreck. Her crew of 40 was reported safe.

The Asia berthed at Southampton with a hole 20 feet long in her port side, extending above and below the water line. Some of the export cars in her hold were under water.

The ship will dock for repairs, which are expected to take a month, and her cargo may be transferred to another vessel.

It was hoped the Asia's two passengers, Charles Williamson of Montreal and Anthony Cowd, a British immigrant for Alberta, might transfer to the Queen Ma. 7, but she sailed five minutes before the Asia tied up.

Hawks Strengthening For Coming Season

MONCTON, N. B., Aug. 25 — (CP) — Names of two hockey players expected to seek berths with Moncton Hawks when their training camp opens here Oct. 10 were released tonight by club officials.

They are Ron Teitel, defenseman, from Winnipeg, and Ray Barry, last year with Toronto St. Mike's Juniors of the Ontario Hockey Association.

This raised to eight the number of names released to date by club officials. Others are Pete Piquette, goalie, last season with Oshawa Generals juniors of the O. H. A.; Buck Whitlock, leading scorer in the Maritime Senior Hockey League last season, and a two-year man with Hawks; Dalton Barkwell and Bert Steele, last year with the now defunct Truro, N. S., entry in the league; Joe Dadeau of Edmundston, N. B., and Bill Lantz, last season with the Scottish League.

Club officials said negotiations with other players in Quebec and Ontario are going on and their names will be released when satisfactory terms are arranged. Several members of last year's team are expected back for tryouts.

Picked Up After Adrift Ten Days

NEW YORK, Aug. 25 — (AP) — The tanker New Jersey reported tonight to the coast guard that it has picked up Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin F. Carlin — drifting 270 miles from New York in the Atlantic in an amphibious jeep — and was taking them to Halifax, N. S.

The coast guard said the tanker reported that the Carlins had been drifting 10 days.

Mr. and Mrs. Carlin set out early this month in a surplus army amphibious jeep on what they said was a round-the-world tour.

Their first destination was the Azores.

They last were seen Aug. 11, 160 miles at sea, when a United States navy destroyer sighted their craft.

There were no further details immediately from the coast guard.

Stories Are Conflicting

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25 — (AP) — Alger Hiss and Whitaker Chambers, face to face in the Congressional spy hearings, took turns today at stinging charges and denials revolving around a tale of a pre-war Red underground in Washington.

Accused and accuser, they brought their utterly conflicting stories into the open at hearings before the House Un-American Activities Committee, and the hearings went on into the night.

Chambers has accused Hiss of being a leader in a Communist underground back in the middle 30's. He repeated the accusations tonight, again under oath.

Hiss listened a few feet away. Earlier it was Chambers' turn to listen. He stared stolidly up toward the lofty ceiling as Hiss questioned his "sanity" and accused him of being a "self-confessed liar, spy and traitor."

Williams Still In Lead

CHICAGO, Aug. 25 — (AP) — Ted Williams' batting leadership in the American League narrowed this week although his percentage remained unchanged from last week at .377.

Cleveland's manager, Lou Boudreau, gained two points on the Boston star, increasing his percentage from .361 to .363.

Others of the first 10 batters this week: Dale Mitchell, Cleveland, .324; Al Zarilla, St. Louis, .321; Barney McCosky, Philadelphia, .314; Luke Appling, Chicago, .314; Bob Dillinger, St. Louis, .307; Walt Evers, Detroit, .307; Joe DiMaggio, New York, .297; George Kell, Detroit, .297, and Bill Gooden, Boston, .297.

Vernon Stephens of Boston topped the runs batted in column, with 11 for the week bringing his season total to 112. Williams had most runs, 90, including seven for the week. Boudreau had most hits, 146. Tom Henrich had most home runs, 12. Ed Stewart of Washington was triples king with 18. Joe DiMaggio had most home runs, his circuit trips numbering 27.

Dillinger's 22 stolen bases topped that department. John Kramer was leading pitcher, winning 14 and losing 4 for Boston to average .778 with 10 games completed. Leland Brisele of Philadelphia had 112 strikeouts.

Huge Building Program For Penn Railroad

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 25 — (AP) — The Pennsylvania railroad announced today it is launching a \$216,700,366 building program, the largest in its history.

Martin Clement, president of the largest rail network in the United States, set forth a plan that would make rolling luxury liners of the trains of the future.

Under the plan, every P.R.R. through passenger train will have supervised children's playrooms, movies, refreshment lounges, temperature controls and other super-modern conveniences.

Here are some of the improvements Clement envisages:

1. Doors that open at a touch through use of compressed air.
2. New style wheel trucks eliminating virtually all sway on curves.
3. Fluorescent lighting throughout giving "a mellow shadowless glow... no glare."
4. Longer passenger coaches with fewer seats, giving more leg room.
5. Sleepers that are all-room cars with "no more open-section berths... extra-wide panoramic windows... enclosed wardrobes and ample luggage space."
6. Widespread use of private rooms for daytime travel on short trips.

Quick Recovery Of Stolen Bonds

QUEBEC, Aug. 25 — (CP) — Quebec City police made a quick arrest today and recovered \$26,000 worth of bonds forgotten in a hotel washroom shortly before by J. N. E. Grenier, a broker.

Police arrested Isidore Kraft, who described himself as a fur dealer, and charged him with theft of the bonds which were on their way to the Sisters at Hotel Dieu Hospital.

Brig. Grenier, the broker, carrying the bonds in a brief case, left them in a washroom at downtown St. Roch Hotel where he lunches every day.

When he noticed his loss and was unable to locate the bonds, city detectives were summoned.

They made a rapid search and finally took Kraft into custody on an suspicion. They said they found the brief case and bonds in his possession, as well as a large sum of money.

Kraft was charged with theft in sessions court.

OTTAWA, Aug. 25 — Francisco Pardo de Zela, Peruvian commercial attaché, said today the Russian charge d'affaires wrote Aug. 21 "regretting his inability to be present" at a diplomatic reception for Hon. Ray Atherton, retiring United States Ambassador to Canada.

The gathering was held last night at the home of Hon. Alfred Benavides, Peruvian ambassador. It was attended by the heads of 33 foreign missions. The Russian charge, Nikolai D. Belokhovostkov, was not present.

"The Peruvian Embassy," Mr. de Zela said in a statement, "had received three days before the date of the reception a letter from the charge d'affaires of the U.S.S.R. embassy, acknowledging the invitation but regretting his inability to be present due to a previous engagement for that day."

Rebel Forces In Escape Attempt

RANGOON, Aug. 25 — (AP) — The Burmese Government said today that Communist-led rebel forces were in full flight from the Tharawaddy district in mid-western Burma, pursued by Loyal troops who had split the Rebels into two groups.

The rebels are attempting to escape to Arakan on the west and Toungoo in Central Burma, the government said.

Today's communique detailed government successes on all fronts, including the killing of six well-known Communist leaders and capture of another.

Experienced political informants here have expressed concern for the future of the seven-month-old republic of Burma unless the revolt is crushed and normal conditions restored without delay.
