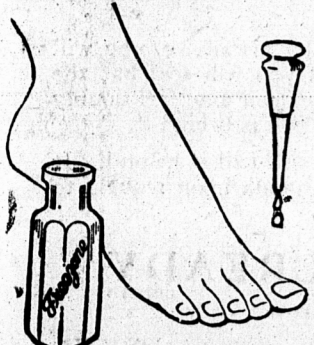

## Improvements to City Post Office

The recent changes made in the Post Office are a great improvement. By having the stamp vendors wicket placed in the corner it now occupies near the main entrance more room is afforded and the former congestion is done away with and the window which lights the vendors wicket brightens all that end of the hall which was formerly dim.

The ceiling or roof on the Registration and Money Order departments has been raised, glass panels being inserted all along the upper portion of the walls, which serve to brighten these departments much more than formerly.

The Assistant Postmaster's Office has been merged with the Registration Department extending that section so as to provide much needed space for the additional business.

The Office known as the Stores Department adjoining the Registration Section has also been roofed over following the plan of the other sections. This proves a great advantage as before the occupants were exposed to the cold drafts which were always felt while the outside door was open for the reception and despatch of the mails.

An improvement has also been made in the General Office by a rearrangement of the furnishings, which gives additional space and is a general benefit to all.

Altogether the Post Office as remodelled is up-to-date and very creditable. The work was done by the firm of Messrs H. and S. Lowe.

These are permanent improvements and it is interesting to note that it is the intention to have the entire building completely renovated and decorated. Tenders are now being called for this work.

## STUDENT CHARGED WITH REVOLUTIONARY ACTIVITIES WILL PROBABLY BE DEPORTED

TORONTO, April 28—Lieb Samsonvitch, who, with two others has been arrested here charged with revolutionary activities, and who will probably be deported, was a student at Columbia University for over three years. He was expelled from that institution for seditious utterances during a preparedness speech delivered by Major General Wood of the United States army to the students. He tried vainly to gain admission to Yale and Harvard but his record was against him. So he came to Buffalo and crossed the border in an automobile without registering his entry into Canada. He tried to enter a college at St. John, N. B., but was turned down. He was also refused admittance to Toronto University.

On January 19 and February he addressed Socialistic gatherings in Toronto advocating bloody war, and later he addressed a foreign unemployed assembly in front of the city hall.

Quite an armament of revolvers and munitions was found in the headquarters of the trio when arrested.

OTTAWA, May 4.—The Medical Freedom League of Ottawa was formed in the Y. M. C. A. last night with H. G. Barber as president and Rev. J. M. Adlard as secretary. Determining to resist any attack on health of liberty in the form of compulsory vaccination, the meeting went further and declared for a medical freedom. Medical domination in public affairs was characterized as both evil and tyrannous, and the claims on behalf of the vaccination were refuted and denied.

## RABBIT SKINNERS WANTS \$120 A WEEK

NEW YORK, May 5.—Twenty-five men who have been getting \$90 a week at the United Skinners' Association at 137-139 Logan avenue, Jersey City, struck Thursday last for an increase of piece-work pay that would enable them to earn \$120 a week. They are rabbit-skinners, and can work only four months a year. Their demand was refused, and police protection was sent from the West Montgomery Street Police Station. Solomon Cohen, of 239 Belmont avenue, a sympathizer with the strikers got into a mix-up and was arrested on a charge of assaulting Gordon Morris, the Secretary and Treasurer of the company.
