SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

April 25

THE LOST SHEEP AND THE LOST COIN

Golden Text: Luke xv. 10.

Lesson: Luke xv. 1-10.

"Even so, I say unto you, there is joy in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner that repenteth."

THE NARRATIVE

Our last lesson had to do with the severe terms of discipline which Jesus uttered to the multitude as they followed Him when He left the house of the Pharisee. Chapter fourteen, with its account of the uttering of those terms, is closely linked with chapter fifteen in a way which we are apt to overlook. The final words of Jesus were, "He that hath ears to hear, let him hear," and Luke immediately records the fact, "Now all the publicans and sinners were drawing near unto Him for to hear Him." He had roused the crowds with some of the severest words that ever fell from His lips, but His last words had left the door of access to Himself open. Whereas He sought disciples who would be prepared to share His enterprises of building and of conflict, if there were those who could hear such teaching, then let them do so.

That suggestion was immediately responded to by the publicans and sinners. A profound need is over the qualification for hearing the profound teaching. These men having no satisfaction in their own righteousness, and no spiritual hope centred in themselves, turned eagerly to One Who was thus unapologetically honest in His dealing with them, notwithstanding that He set up conditions so searching.

In all that followed, our Lord presented to these people, teaching of matchless strength and tenderness, the attitude of God toward all such things. It is to be observed that the teaching was given for the benefit of Pharisees and scribes, and for the comfort of publicans and sinners.

ners. When the former saw Him consorting with the latter, they murmured, and His answer to the criticism of their murmuring was that found in the fifteenth chapter. As a matter of fact this is one parable, having three phases of revelation. The three stories are unified by the fact that they deal with lost things; the lost sheep, the lost silver, and the lost son; that they tell the story of the seeking and the finding of these lost things. In their entirety they constitute, as we have said, a revelation of the attitude of God toward men in their deepest need. It is generally conceded that the first phase is specially illustrative of the work of the Son; while the last reveals the Father; the central one sets forth the work of the Spirit through the Church.

The lesson of today deals with the first two movements in the parable. Our Lord's method in these movements was that of appeal to the natural instincts, first of those who were criticising Him, and then of womanhood. In the first He appealed to these men themselves, as He said, "What man of you having an hundred sheep." In the second He illustrated by the true activities in the household. He said, "What woman having ten pieces of silver?"

In the first phase of the parable the figure is that of the shepherd and the flock, and so in harmony with the Biblical view, it is that of the Kingdom. The whole flock is seen as ideally folded under the care and authority of the shepherd. One of the sheep is lost. The shepherd leaves the ninety-nine in safety, and goes after the one. This is done in the interest of the one whose safety depends upon his position in the fold; in the interest of the flock which is incomplete while one of its number is missing; and in the interest of the owner. While not entering into any description thereof, the story suggests the penitence and sacrifice of the pilgrim, and the however, on the note of joy as the shepherd returns, bringing the lost one with him.

The second figure is that of the household the woman watches. She the home. Over the well-being of this household the woman watches. She finds that one coin is lost, and immediately gives herself to the task of diligent search in the interest of the owner and in the interest of the household. Again the last note is that of joy, in which her neighbors share, as the coin is found.

THE TEACHING.

The supreme notes of these pictures are those of their revelation of the work of the Son and the Spirit in the case of all such as are, in any sense of the word, lost. These multitudes thronging and pressing around Him, publicans and sinners held in contempt of the Pharisees, Jesus saw as lost. It should never be forgotten that however appalling the thought is which is suggested by the word "lost," the implicate of the word is that of the living right, and those who are lost. The sheep belongs to the shepherd. The coin is the property of the woman. This suggests at once the dignity of men, and the tragedy of their condition. Knowing that dignity, and understanding in full the terrible nature of that tragedy, the Son as the Shepherd has undertaken the mission of seeking and saving the lost. In such an enterprise privations and pains and pain were necessarily involved. These facts gave Him no pause. Undaunted by them, and impelled by His love, He came forth from the Father into the world for the express purpose of doing that which Pharisees and scribes murmured against, receiving sinners.

The particular emphasis in the second story is that of His persistence with which the search for the coin
